The Rhondad Valley Coal Field Lays Claim to the Scrappiest Region

London, Sept. 22.—(By Mail).—The scrappiest, swiftest part in the world—that is the boast of the Rhondad Valley in the coal fields of Wales.

Saturday night in the public bars the matches are made and all Rhondad valley's male population turns out in the dawn of Sunday to battle or watch in the hills that cup the valley. Every

week end from New Year's to Christmas and on through the holidays the program goes on.

This is about how it happens: Bill Williams ambles down to the pub for his Saturday evening's evening of beer and a hard week's work and a pretty good supper at home. He is at peace with the world and inclined to keep it, but only on certain terms.

Down in the bar is Floyd Jenkins. He is a lot like Bill; has worked hard all week, just tucked in a satisfactory supper and is penitent on the same conditions.

Bill surrounds a cover of floating boys and gives voice to some critical opinions on conscription or politics.

Floyd is a radical, too, but just the other way. Of course he can't stand by and hear his finest convictions run into the ground, so he wallops Bill on the nose.

Friends intervene and the belligerents draw on liberal night caps before winding their way home.

The same incident has been reported in perhaps a score of places.

Bill doesn't hate Floyd; he hates him for his wrong convictions and so they are going to battle for a principle.

Sunday morning they meet and fight to a knockout—out in the open, whatever the weather, with no ropes, no gloves and only the grass for the ring.

If Bill wins he is undoubtedly right about conscription or whatever it was he was expounding.

The other fighters settle their controversies in the same way.

Jimmy White, the knockout heavyweight champion, came from the Rhondad Valley and learned his fighting up in the hills. The miners are proud of Jimmy and back him to the limit. He, in turn, has done his part by slumbering a lot of good fighters—from flyweights to heavies.

Yes, Freddie Welsh comes from Rhondad, too, but the miners only mention the fact when they mention it at all.

WANTS RELEASED FAIRLY TREATED

All Delegates to Prison Congress Agreed on Need of Fairer Treatment

Buffalo, N. Y., Oct. 10.—Practically all of the delegates to the Congress of the American Prison Association in session here here, today concurred with W. G. MacLaren, superintendent of the Oregon Prisoners' Aid Society, who said prisoners should be closely scrutinized prior to release so that mental defects may be taken care of. He pointed out the defective released specifically go back to crime.

"We should take care of the defective," said MacLaren, "and should demand that the police and peace officers give other released prisoners a chance to get along. The law is not ready now to hand them back to prison."

MacLaren spoke at the meeting this morning here. Rev. H. Miles of Western Conference, Allegheny, Pa.; Rev. S. J. Dowling, State Prison, Wauquon, Wis.; and Rev. Robert Walker of the Massachusetts State Reformatory.

EPISCOPALIANS TO CHANGE CEREMONY

Ten Commandments, Lord's Prayer, Marriage Ceremony May be Changed

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 10.—The Ten Commandments, the marriage ceremony and the Lord's Prayer as they have stood through the ages are to be changed by the general convention of the Protestant Episcopal church which convenes here tomorrow if the reports of committees and sub-committees are endorsed.

In the marriage ceremony the committee will recommend that the words "obey" in the bride's promise be replaced by "keep," that the giving away of the bride be omitted entirely and the groom's promise to "endow" the bride "with all his worldly goods," be eliminated.

A committee will recommend that the commandments be shortened by the omission of the reason for their observance. The recommendation will be based on the fact that the reasons were peculiar to the life of the Israelites and that changed modern ways have robbed the arguments of much of their weight.

The committee on revising the Lord's Prayer will recommend the elimination of the words, "For Thine is the Kingdom and the Power and the Glory forever." In requesting the omission the committee will say the words constitute a part of the Doxology added by early translators and that they are not in the

original text of Holy Scriptures. The omission would make the prayer identical with the Roman Catholic version. The same committee will probably ask the elimination from the Book of Common Prayers the prayers for "Jews, infidels and Turks." The proposal is based on the ground that it is unwarranted to class the Jews with the others.

A canon prohibiting marriage when either party to the contract has a wife or husband living and has been divorced for any cause arising after marriage will be presented for action. Many notable churchmen gathered here today for the opening.
