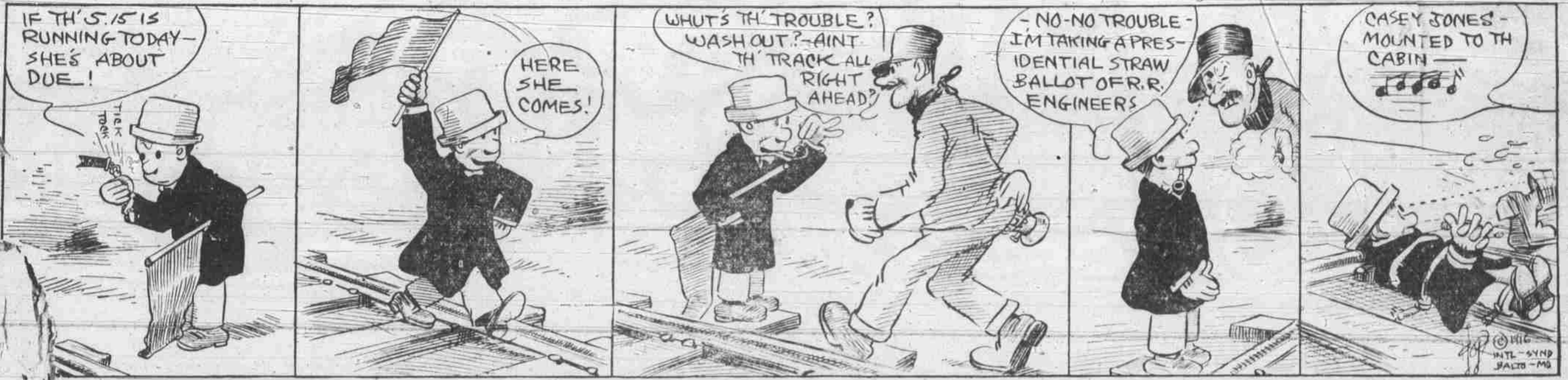

FRENCH FLYERS
DEEP AFFECTION

The Damon and Pythias of
French Aviation Service
Unusual Experiences

BREAKS ALL RECORDS

Are Disappointed over a
Failure to Bring Down
Their Tenth Aeroplane
Together in the European
War.

Paris, Oct. 10.—Lieutenant Pythias
and Lieutenant Damon of the French avia-
tion service, who were killed by the
disappointment of failing to give
down together as they put some-

evening of August 2 and the last

of the first world war.

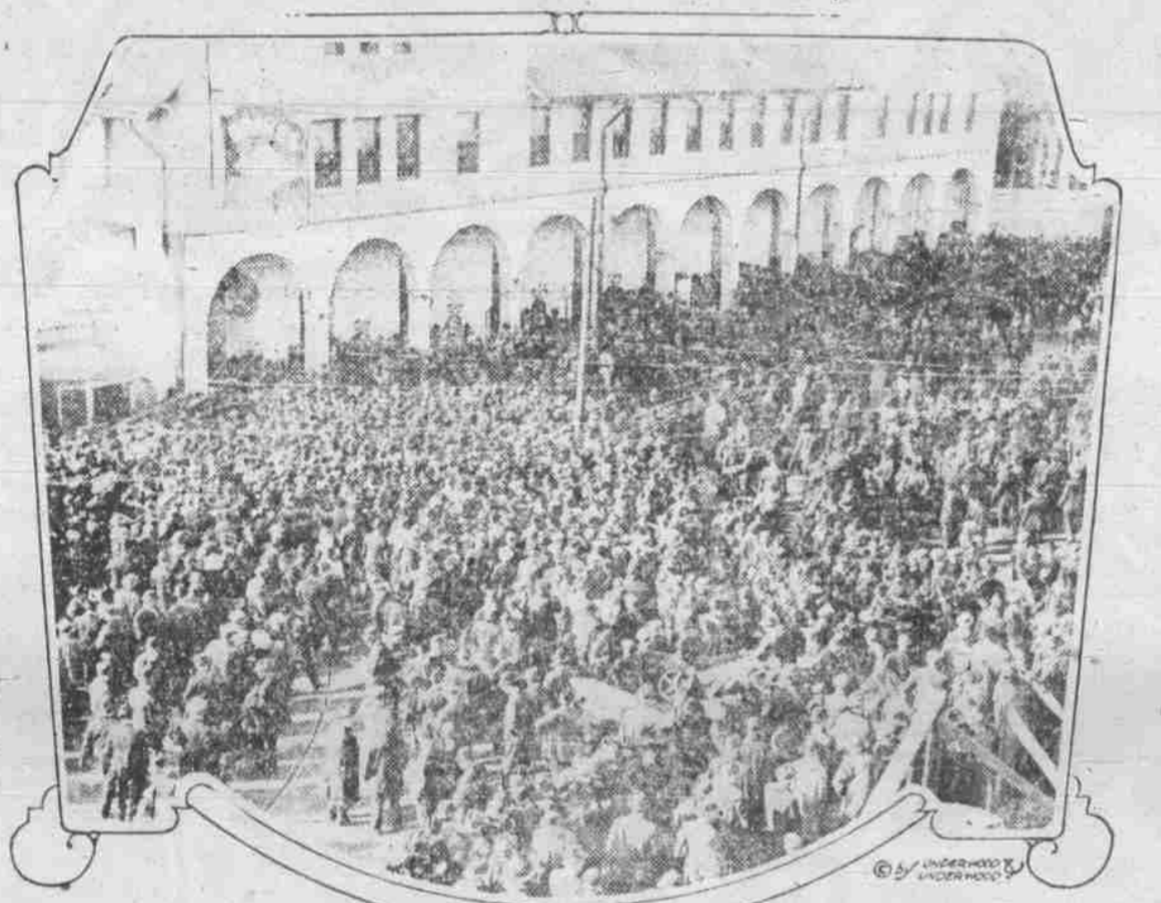
Damon, who is only 24 years old, in

De la Torre, who came from an old
Spanish family, and who had been
a pilot in the Spanish army, was
killed in a crash at Verdun, where
he was flying a biplane.

The two young aviators were
killed instantly together, and
their bodies were buried in the same

ing him down. Their disappointment
was slightly lessened but they frankly
found the fact that their so-
languant compact can no longer be main-
tained.

**WAR LOAN INDICATES
FAITH IN ALLIES**

Tokio, Oct. 10.—The fact that a loan
to Russia of 70 million yen (about \$35,
000,000) was twice oversubscribed by
the public has attracted considerable
attention in Japan and is regarded by
the press as indicating faith in the vic-
tory of the Entente allies and faith in
the power of the rehabilitation of Rus-
sia. The loan was at six per cent and
consisted of Russian treasury bonds.

It is likely that additional loans of a
similar nature will be made subsequent-
ly as Russia desires to raise a total of
250 million yen in Japan (about 125
million dollars). It is understood that
the loan will be utilized in the purchase
of munitions of war purchased by
Russia.

**TO GIVE ARTIFICIAL
LIMBS TO THE
INJURED**

Taking Oct. 10.—Elepeta Salako has
decided to supply artificial limbs and
eyes to the Japanese and Germans who
were wounded in the Philippines at
Kampulow.

The estate belonging to the Imper-
ial Household is estimated to reach
about 200,000,000 yen or \$200,000,000.
Besides railway and bank securities
and various public bonds and seven
percent bonds, the household, which are
valued at approximately 150,000,000 yen
or \$150,000,000, the imperial holdings in-
clude extensive forests and rice land,
in addition to the land of the imper-
ial palace grounds and the imperial de-
partments and villas. The value of the
imperial property is reported to be
increasing at the rate of twenty per
cent per annum.

The money disbursed from the privy
purse is said to reach an enormous fig-
ure. The great serious demands are due
to the various court ceremonies and
expenses of state, the maintenance of
intercourse with the Imperial house-
holds or rulers of the friendly treaty
powers, the reception and entertaining
of occasional guests representing for-
eign courts and governments, stipends,
pensions and other allowances to house-
hold members, donations and gifts to
charitable institutions and general re-
lief work.

**TITLE 'JEFE DE LAS ARMAS'
ORDERED ABOLISHED IN MEXICO**

Mexico City, Oct. 10.—An order has
been issued by General Alvaro Obregon,
Minister of War, abolishing the
title and position of "Jefe de las Ar-
mas," throughout the republic. This is
taken here to mean one of the initial
steps in the diminishing of military con-
trol throughout Mexico. Heretofore
the power of the Jefe de las Armas of
military matters, supervised those
of the civil authorities and judges.
Hereafter, according to Obregon's de-
cree, the commanders of garrisons will
have authority over their own men only
and will not deal in any way with the
