BIG ORCHESTRA HAS COSTLY INSTRUMENTS

When the Metropolitan Opera House Orchestra goes on tour, the amount of insurance taken out on the individual instruments that go to make up the orchestra equals five figures. Of course, this does not take into consideration the intrinsic value attached by the owners due to some association. For instance, a Galletti instrument, made about 1705 is valued at \$5,000.

The felloes are worth about the same amount and the violas just a little bit less. There is a Stradivarius bass viola valued at \$2,000 and then there are violins by Amati, Maggini and other makers, to which no real commercial value can be attached. The instruments used in the orchestra is worth about \$2,000 while the trumpets and trombones, the French horns, tenors and others range in value from \$50 to \$300 each.

RICHMOND MAN COMMITS SUICIDE

Richmond, April 28.—Returning to his boarding house upon the receipt of a letter from his sister, Harry Allen, twenty-five years old, a clerk in the general offices of the Richmond, Fredericksburg and Potomac Railroad Company, went to his room at 132 North Twenty-first street shortly before 10 o'clock yesterday, seated himself on the bed after removing his coat, and blew off the top of his head with a shotgun. Death was instantaneous. The police are investigating all evidence disclosed pointing conclusively to a case of suicide.

Detective Sergeant Wily, of headquarters in the case immediately after a report of the suicide was made to the police. He advised the body to be turned over to an undertaker. Allen had apparently removed his coat on entering the room, for this article was found hanging on a chair after sitting himself on the bed. It seems to have placed the barrel of the

shotgun in his mouth and pulled the trigger with this foot. The full force of the explosion almost completely demolished his face and head, only his chin remaining. One of his ears was blown across the room. The police were unable to learn any motive for his action.

LOUISBURG MAN FOUND DEAD IN BED

Louisburg, April 28.—J. T. Gattis was found dead in bed yesterday morning at the residence of his son, C. M. Gattis, in this city. Mr. Gattis was in his usual good health Thursday night when he retired. His grandson, Willie Floyd Gattis, slept in room with him, and had no intimation of his death until morning. He was 74 years old. He was a native of Orange county, and had lived in Raleigh about 21 years, where his body will be carried to lay for interment. He was a highly respected citizen.

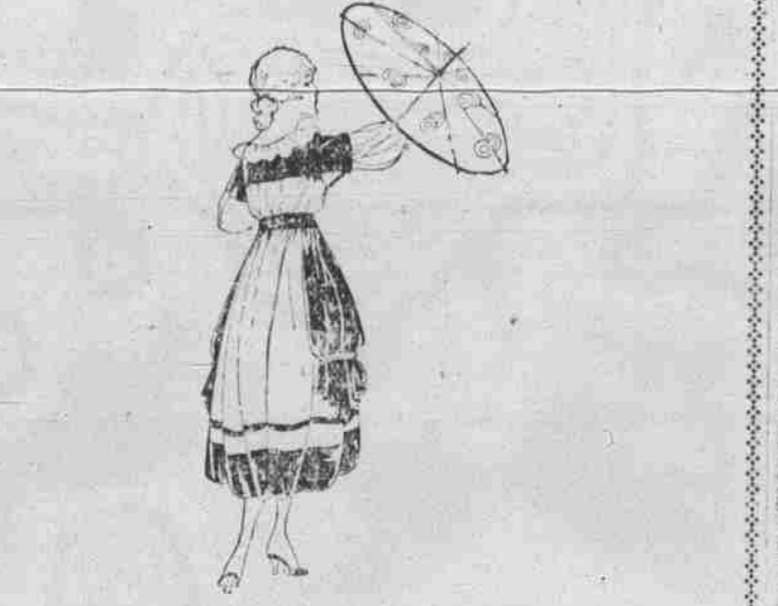
