ANNIVERSARY OF ST. MARY'S SCHOOL

Seventy-Fifth Year of That Institution to be Celebrated on Friday and Saturday, May 11 and 12.

Raleigh, May 8.—The seventy-fifth anniversary of the founding of St. Mary's School, the school which was opened by the Rev. D. Albert Smiles on May 12, 1842, will be fittingly celebrated at the school next Friday and Saturday, May 11 and 12.

The program will be as follows:

Friday, May 11.

8:00 p. m.—Anniversary exercises in the auditorium in the chapel (with music). 9:00 a. m.—Breakfast.

10:30 a. m.—Student exercises in the auditorium.

2:00 p. m.—Aniversary luncheon in Clement Hall in honor of the alumnae with brief after-dinner speeches.

5:00 p. m.—Anniversary festival in the grove, with the students and alumnae participating.

8:30 p. m.—Student entertainment in auditorium in honor of the visitors. The chorus class in Gilbert and Sullivan's opera, "Patience."

Miss McVea, who will be the alumnae speaker on Friday evening, was long connected with St. Mary's as student, teacher, lady principal, and is now the president of Sweetwater College.

The festival in the afternoon of Saturday, May 12, is to be participated in by all members of the school and by alumnae. The festival procession will be a presentation of the various departments of the work and life of the school suggested by appropriate costumes, symbols and music, followed by groups of alumnae giving suggestions of episodes

in the history of the school. The outdoor entertainment will consist of tableau, songs, dances, drills and the performance of a short French play, "La Dame Claque," and of the fete scene of "Winter's Tale." In the evening the operetta "Pafienre," will be given, in the auditorium.

The vector has extended its invitation to the alumnae to attend the celebration, the school expecting 2,000 claim in the house as many as 500 to accommodate and inviting all the alumnae not only to the various entertainments but also to a lunch on Saturday, May 12.

Both faculty and students are hoping that the celebration will draw many alumnae to the school and will prove a great success in its history.


