ANNIVERSARY OF ST. MARY'S SCHOOL

Seventy-Fifth Year of That Institution to be Celebrated on Friday and Saturday, May 11 and 12.

Raleigh, May 8.—The seventy-fifth anniversary of the founding of St. Mary's School, the school which was opened by the Rev. D. Albert Smeades on May 12, 1842, will be fittingly celebrated at the school next Friday and Saturday, May 11 and 12.

The program will be as follows: Friday, May 11. 8:00 p. m.—Anniversary exercises in the auditorium. Addresses by Mrs. Kathie W. McVea (S. M. S. 1881), president of Sweetbrier College, and Dr. W. S. Currell, president of the University of South Carolina.

Saturday, May 12. 8:00 a. m.—Celebration of the Holy Communion in the chapel (with music). 9:30 a. m.—Breakfast. 10:30 a. m.—Student exercises in the auditorium. 2:00 p. m.—Anniversary luncheon in Clement Hall in honor of the alumnus with brief after-dinner speeches.

5:00 p. m.—Anniversary festival in the gymnasium with the students and alumnus participating. 8:30 p. m.—Student entertainment in the auditorium in honor of the visitors. The chorus class in Gilbert and Sullivan's opera, "Patience."

Miss McVea, who will be the alumnus speaker on Friday evening, was long connected with St. Mary's as student, teacher, lady principal, and is now the president of Sweetbrier College.

The festival in the afternoon of Saturday, May 12, is to be participated in by all members of the school and by alumnus. The festival procession will be a presentation of the various departments of the work and life of the school suggested by appropriate costumes, symbols and music, followed by groups of alumnus giving suggestions of episodes

in the history of the school. The outdoor entertainment will consist of tableaux, songs, dances, drills and the performance of a short French play, "La Derniere Classe," and of the fete scene of "Winter's Tale." In the evening the opera "Patience" will be given in the auditorium.

The center line extended an invitation to the alumnus to attend the celebration, the school expecting to entertain in the house as many as 500 for the occasion and inviting all the alumnus not only to the various entertainments but also to a lunch on Saturday, May 12. Both faculty and students are hoping that the celebration will draw many alumnus to the school and will prove a red letter day in its history.

NEGRO GETS SIX MONTHS ON ROADS

There was a slight increase in the number of defendants before Judge Fountain at this morning's session of municipal court. Alonzo Williams, a negro, was the only one who failed to appear in court. Alonzo was alleged to have maliciously injured personal property and also having committed larceny on the side. Judge Fountain decided that Alonzo was in need of some physical culture and therefore Alonzo will leave the shovel and pick on the Rocky Mount Road district for the next six months.

Alonzo Williams also answered to a charge of obtaining money under false pretense and judgment against him on this charge was suspended.

Ernest Hammond and Mairie Hall, negroes, were charged with indulging in disorderly conduct and their case was continued until tomorrow.

Joseph Scott, a negro, was charged with using the sidewalk as a thoroughfare for his bicycle and paid a fine of \$2.

Archie McBride, a negro, was charged with giving his feathered fowl too much liberty and as this offense is somewhat controversial to the gar-

dening movement that has been so successful in this city Judge Fountain decided that Archie should be relieved of one dollar. From this it is intimated all other feathered birds found running at large will make their owners subject to a fine and the moral is to keep your chickens in your own back yard.

ELABORATE PROGRAM FOR ELKS MEETING

Raleigh, N. C., May 8.—The Antlered Tribe of the State will take charge of the Capital City next Tuesday. The local Elks are sparing no effort to make the stay of the visitors the most pleasant they have enjoyed in any city in the State on these annual occasions. Decorations are already being put up and poles have been planted at the head of Fayetteville street for a grand arch.

A magnificently printed program has been prepared for the sessions of the State association.

An open meeting will be held in the city auditorium on Tuesday night at 8:30 o'clock, to which the public is invited. A series of welcomes will be made by Mayor Johnson and the response to this will be made by Mr. William Braham, of Durham. Special music and singing will be a feature.

The parade will be held on Wednesday afternoon, beginning at 5:30 o'clock and the Elks' Jubilee will take place at 8:30 o'clock on Fayetteville street. The day will close with a supper at the Elks' Home.

The installation of officers and awarding of prizes will take place at the auditorium at 10 o'clock Thursday morning. A barbecue at the State Fair Grounds will be held at 2 o'clock. The members are particularly pleased that Grand Exalted Ruler Edward Rightor, of New Orleans, will be in attendance and on Tuesday night, at the Elks' Home, a reception will be given in his honor.
