The superintendents of the Wilmington and Norfolk districts of the Atlantic Coast Line Railway, to succeed the late B. J. Hughes and Van R. C. "BUFFALO BILL" IN FINAL RESTING PLACE

Denver, Colo., June 4.—At sunrise yesterday morning the body of Col. William F. Cody, "Buffalo Bill," was taken from its temporary resting place in a Denver hospital and taken to a vault below the 20th rock of "Wildcat Point," on Lookout Mountain, there to remain. From the summit of the mountain the peaks of the states of Kansas, Nebraska and Wyoming are visible. It was upon these peaks that the old scout and hunter spent his early life. Often in later years when a snowstorm he had come to the place and it was his fondness for the scenery that led those in charge of the funeral to choose "Wildcat Point" as the place of his last resting place. Colonel Cody died on January 10, last, on January 13 public funeral services, attended by thousands of persons with a and outside of Colorado, were held for the funeral. Yesterday's services were simple and no provision was made for the attendance of a great crowd. The massive bronze coffin containing the great scout's body was sealed into the vault with the rites of the Masonic funeral service, which was performed by Golden City Lodge, No. 1, the oldest Masonic organization in this part of the West. A delegation of Knights Templar from the commandery in North Platte, of which Colonel Cody also was a member, acted as escort. Members of the Rocky Mountain Rangers, of which organization the Colonel was a member, formed a guard of honor. Miss Hazel Bennett, of Denver, a niece of Colonel Cody, sang "The Brigade," a favorite song of the Old Scout.

The vault in which the body was placed was in the center of a memorial building to be erected in the memory of the pioneers of all America. The remains of this building will be the tomb of Colonel Cody. In its wings will be devoted respectively to a library of pioneer lore and a gallery in which are to be hung paintings of the great pioneers of the State. This building is to be surrounded by a granite terrace on which will be a bronze equestrian statue of Colonel Cody.

GOLDSBORO SCHOOLS CLOSED SATURDAY

Goldsboro, N. C., June 1.—The Goldsboro graded schools closed the 1917 session Saturday night with an address by Prof. W. B. Dand, state high school inspector of North Carolina, who was introduced to his large audience by Prof. N. W. Walker, state high school inspector of North Carolina and the awarding of medals and diplomas. There were seven hundred in the graduating class. The exercises began Friday morning when the graduating class of the high school gave a most interesting and high creditable program before a large audience. The exercises were entirely in charge of the class itself and were opened by the singing of the class song. This was followed by a very excellent and admirable address by the president of the class, Mr. John Robinson Morris.

MAYOR MITCHEL HAD REBEL GRANDFATHER

London, June 5.—London newspapers took particular interest in the meeting of Mayor Mitchell in New York. They recalled that the mayor's grandfather, John Mitchell, was an Irish rebel who was convicted in 1848 and sent to the Australian prison colony. He escaped to the United States in 1855 and returned to Ireland in 1874. He was then so broken in health that he was not re-arrested. Tipperary elected him to Parliament but was declared ineligible. Thereupon Tipperary re-elected him, but he soon afterward died. One of the newspapers remarked charitably, in recalling these facts that Mitchell, the rebel name of decent people for his father was the Rev. John Mitchell, of county Down.
