URGED TO GROW RYE IN THE SOUTHEAST

Washington, D. C., Sept. 18.—Rye should be more generally grown in many parts of the Southeastern States than it is at present, says the United States Department of Agriculture. This is especially desirable, it adds as a present war measure.

Wheat and rye should be considered together in any program for increasing the supply of bread grains—especially for home-grown bread, in the southeast. There are many places, for example, where rye can be grown with less risk than wheat. On poor, sandy soils, rye is suited to wheat; rye may save cost and it will make a crop with less fertilizer. For normal cultivation it is not advisable to pay the existing high prices for potato for the crop. Rye can be used as a bread grain not only by those who are accustomed to it, but many others who have not eaten rye-bread are likely to find it a welcome variation in breadstuffs.

Rye is the best grain in most of the Southeastern States as a cover, green manure, and grazing crop. Home-grown seed of rye, as with most others, is best. Northern grown seed is not suitable for sowing in the South.

MANY WAR CRANKS IN WASHINGTON

Washington, Sept. 18.—The real President of the United States arrived in Washington the other day. He admitted it.

"I came," he announced, as he stepped off the train from Krakow, "to take possession of the White House. Wilson was elected by fraud. I will drive out the usurper."

NOVEMBER TO BE MONTH FOR THRIFT

Raleigh, N. C., Sept. 17.—In an appeal to the farmers of North Carolina and Virginia, for the most thorough observance of "Thrifty month" during November, Governor Beckett says North Carolina farmers have, with supererogatory sense, increased food and feed crops, canned and dried surplus fruits and vegetables, so the high cost of living may be lower. All products command higher prices, and there is an opportunity for the average farmer to lift himself and family to higher levels of happiness and hope.

The Governor asks that during thrifty month every farmer make it a point to do some of a number of things enumerated as a guarantee of thrift. These include getting a term of a tenant, paying debts and start on cash basis, open savings accounts, purchase milk cow or breed swine, build waterworks and lights until houses and barns, set out fruit trees. He says the complete census will be made in this State the first week in December to ascertain just how many farmers have realized the great opportunity now confronting them in conserving the fruits of this unparalleled year's work.
