

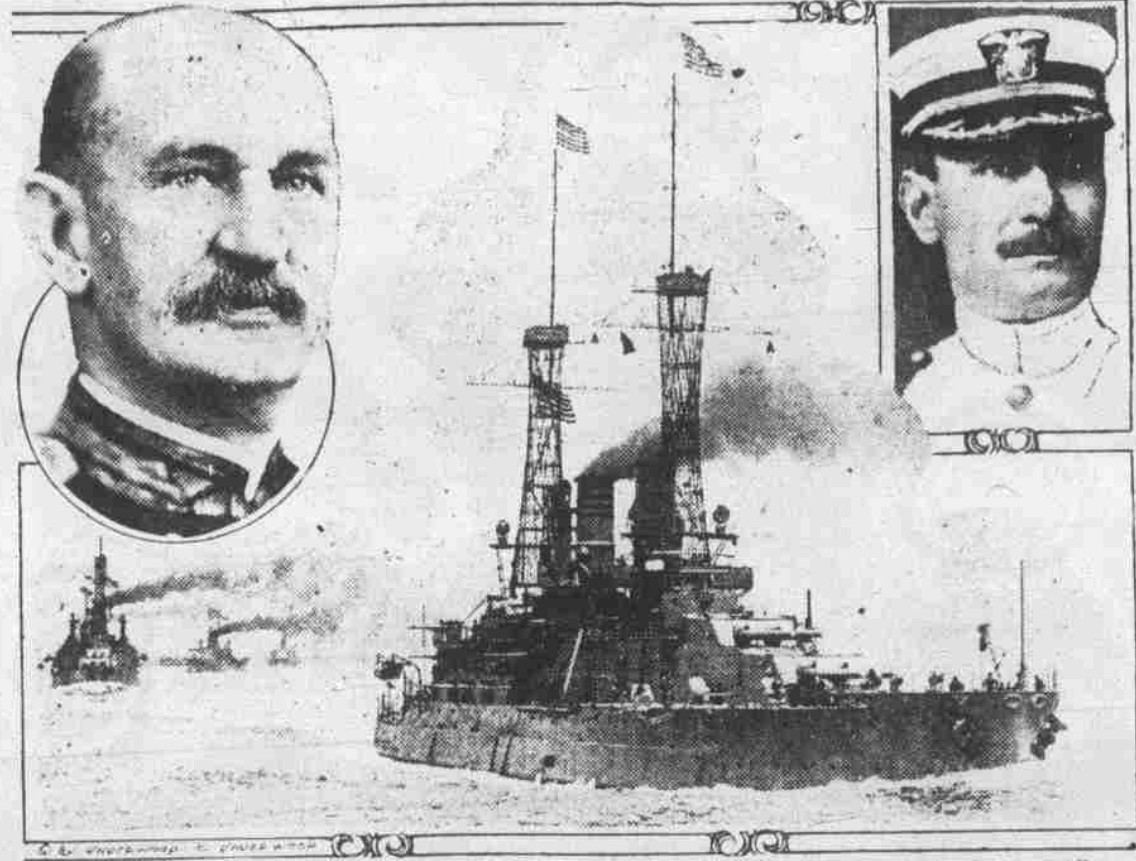

PACIFIC COAST METAL WORKERS GO ON STRIKE

Seattle, Sept. 29.—Twelve thousand metal workers employed in Seattle ship yards struck today to force demands for higher wages and the use of eight hour lumber. Three large steel ship yards and 95 smaller plants were closed as the result of the strike.

NO EVIDENCE IN 'SLUSH' CASE

Wrangle in the House Breaks Out Anew This Morning

Washington, Sept. 29.—The German "slush" fund wrangle broke out again on the floor of the House today with the presentation of a letter by Chairman Pou of the subcommittee from Secretary Lansing declaring the State Department had no evidence indicating members of Congress had any connection with Count Von Bernstorff's \$5,000 fund.

ASK EXPULSION SEN. LAFOLLETTE

Governor of Minnesota and State Commission Ask that Senator Be Expelled from the Senate.

Washington, Sept. 29.—A communication from the Governor of Minnesota and the State public safety commission requesting the expulsion from the Senate of Senator LaFollette of Wisconsin was presented in the Senate today by Senator Kellogg, of Minnesota and referred by Vice-President Marshall to the Senate privilege and elections committee.

OTHER APPEALS ARE RECEIVED

Washington, Sept. 29.—Senator Kellogg received the communication which was adopted by the state commission as the result of Senator LaFollette's recent speech at St. Paul. Before presenting it to the senate he conferred with Vice President Marshall, Senator Martin of Virginia, Democratic leader, and Senator Foraker of Ohio, chairman of the committee to which it was referred.

Washington, Sept. 29.—The following were nominated today by President Wilson to three vacancies on the Interstate Commerce commission, Robert W. Woodley of Virginia, for the term ending 1920, Clyde B. Atkinson of Oregon, for the term ending in 1921, George W. Anderson of Boston, Mass., for the term ending in 1922.

COTTON MARKET

New York, Sept. 29.—The cotton market was irregular today with the trading showing nervousness while awaiting for a better line on the effects of the tropical storm. The market opened today steady at an advance of 1 point to a decline of 15 points generally lower for a liquidation for the week end and the approaching government report.

GREENSBORO MAN FUEL ADMINISTRATOR

Washington, Sept. 29.—Fuel Administrator Garfield announced last night that A. W. McAllister, of Greensboro, has been appointed fuel administrator for North Carolina.

"DOKEY" CEREMONIAL AT ASHEVILLE

Asheville, N. C., Sept. 29.—Fully 200 members of Suez Temple, No. 71, of Charlotte, Dramatic Order Knights of Khorasan, gathered here yesterday afternoon and last night for the annual ceremonial of the temple held at the Battery Park hotel. They started the ball rolling at 7 o'clock with a torch light parade several blocks in length and led by a band of 200 "Dokeys" were in the line of march, all of them in full uniform. The band confined its efforts to playing one number, "There'll Be a Hot Time in the Old Town Tonight" and the conclusion drawn from
