

JAPAN'S ATTITUDE AT PEACE MEETING CAUSE OF CONCERN

Grave Apprehension Apparent Among Representatives of Powers.

TROUBLE BETWEEN CHINA AND JAPAN

Japs Said to Have Threatened War on China If She Makes Public Secret Treaties and Fails to Carry Out Agreement.

Washington, Feb. 11.—Japan's attitude toward China in the peace conference is causing grave apprehension among the representatives of the other associated powers. According to official diplomatic information reaching here, Japan virtually has threatened war if China makes public secret treaties by which the two countries and failure to carry out the agreement to make Japan the successor of Germany in rights, its property and concessions held by Germany at the outbreak of the European war.

China is relying on the peace conference where her delegates are said to have made an excellent disposition and is seeking support from the United States and Great Britain.
