

MARTIAL LAW DECLARED IN GERMANY TO PUT DOWN MOB DEMONSTRATIONS WHICH ARE SWEEPING OVER BERLIN

Ten Known to Have Been Killed in Rush Before Reichstag Building

MACHINE GUNS ARE TURNED UPON CROWD

Masses of Working People Waved Red Flags and Clamored for Success Soviet—Protest Against a New Industrial Bill.

Berlin, Tuesday, Jan. 13. (S. P. A.) (By The Associated Press.)—The government tonight proclaimed martial law in all sections of Germany following the mob demonstrations this afternoon in which at least 100 were killed and many others injured by machine guns from towers in front of the Reichstag building. Gustav Noske, the minister of defense, has been appointed commander in chief of the greater Berlin district and Brandenburg provinces.

Street parades, meetings and demonstrations of all kinds have been prohibited.

TIBETAN REICHSTAG

Berlin, Jan. 13. The mob organized by extremists as a protest against the industrial bill, which was passed by the Reichstag here on Tuesday morning, by noon of Tuesday morning, to the Tier Garten, was crowded with masses of people carrying red flags and placards. When the Reichstag convened at 2 o'clock the crowd surrounding the building was estimated at 40,000 and a new organization of workers people carrying red flags and banners insisted with the crowd to call power to the Soviet. It continued to arrive.

Attempts were made by the guards to quietly disperse the mob, but it was needless warning. At last the mob, reckless of machine guns, rifles and other defenders of the building, made a rush against the police lines trying to disarm the guards and disable the machine guns. When it was seen that the mob could not be checked in any other way, fire was opened on it. The Reichstag continued its sitting until 6 o'clock, at which time it was announced that ten bodies of persons killed in the fight had been brought into the building.

Earthquake Destroys Another Mexican Town

Mexico City, Jan. 13. San Jose, a village of 3,000 inhabitants in the Jalisco district, state of Vera Cruz, was destroyed this morning by an earthquake, according to advices given by the department of agriculture which gave no details as to the casualties.

CENSUS WORKERS ASK CO-OPERATION

Co-operation of Transients in the City Necessary to Complete Task.

According to Mr. J. C. Phares, who is engaged in taking the census in this city, the completion of the task during the allotted period for the work is impossible unless the residents of the city co-operate in every possible way with the enumerators in their undertaking. The permanent residents are comparatively easy to secure, but the transient population is causing the census workers considerable trouble.

In order to alleviate this trouble and make possible the enumeration of the task within the month, those in charge of the census work are requesting that all temporary sojourners in the city who are residing in hotels or boarding houses leave the necessary card, including their name, age, nationality, occupation, rank, their parents' names, in order that the enumerators may get it on their first call and not be forced to make several different trips or calls after they have left a person.

The local workers declare that they are already behind with their work because of existing conditions and that unless this request for co-operation is complied with they cannot possibly complete their work within the month allowed for the census taking or do justice to the city by recording its total population.
