EDWIN P. MEREDITH TO FILL HOUSTON'S PLACE

New Secretary Agriculture is Editor and Publisher of Farm Paper—Two Nominations to go to Congress Today.

Washington, Jan. 27.—Edwin P. Meredith, editor of Successful Farming, will be named secretary of the treasury in the place of Charles Glass. Immediately upon the death of Secretary Glass, Meredith was named by President Wilson as secretary of the agriculture department. Meredith is 45 years old and his home is in De Moines, Iowa. Before starting "Successful Farming" he was the publisher of the Farmers' Tribune. He was a candidate for the United States senate in 1911 and for governor of Iowa in 1916. President Wilson was expected to send the nomination of both Mr. Houston and Mr. Meredith to the senate today.
