DEMAND LUMP SUM FOR EVERY FORMER U. S. SERVICE MAN

Head of War Organization
Asks Payment \$500 for
Former Fighters

OPPOSES PROPOSAL OF OTHER ORGANIZATIONS

Witness Tells Ways and
Means Committee Service
Men Need Aid in Securing
Civilian Positions—Says
Government Should Help.

Washington, March 5.—The demand of a lump sum of \$500 to each person who served in the military or naval forces of the United States will be made to the House Ways and Means committee today by Marvin Gates, speaker, national president of the private soldiers and sailors' league.

He opposed proposals of congressional committees of other veterans organizations to make a lump sum payment to former fighters.

The 43rd night he told the committee he would not be in favor of making a single sum because it would be hard to fix a just amount of money and until the service men's organization got to the position from which they were called without legislation no further statement could be made by the shipping masters except compensation will pending legislation.

The witness declared that the pending of \$100,000,000 in relief on veterans funds showed that the government was "not up to date" and should give financial relief to former service men.

DIFFERENCES BETWEEN ORGANIZATIONS AIRED

Washington, March 5.—Differences between organizations of former service men were aired yesterday before the house ways and means committee, which is considering a bill relating to legislation. Marvin G. Gates, speaker of the private soldiers and sailors' league, who appeared to press it, said the amount of \$500 each former soldier boy and woman, charged that J. H. Bailey, a member of the house ways committee of the committee, had informed him that budgeted funds had been appropriated to the bill, but that the committee had not yet voted on it.

Letters from the soldiers' leaders at New York City asking the nonadoption of all soldier bodies were read, although that the offices of the organizations were raided and much literature thrown into the river.

GIVES OUT VIEW IN RALEIGH CASE

Motion to Squash Profiteering
Case is Denied by
Judge Connor.

Raleigh, March 5.—In an effort to banded down today Federal Judge Henry G. Connor denied the motion to squash the case of W. A. Myers, a tall grocer of Raleigh, who was indicted at the recent term of federal court on the charge of profiteering in sugar, stating that the defendant should plead the bill to the end and that a trial of the issue be held in a lower court, suggested by a judge sitting.

The decision of Judge Connor in the Myer's case will be of importance in regard to the cases of the other Raleigh merchants indicted on the same charge and continued until the May term of Federal court.

STORMS RAPIDLY SWEEP EASTWARD

Blizzard is Expected to
Reach Atlantic Coast
States Tonight.

SNOW IS PREDICTED

Weather Bureau Forecasts
Say Rain Will Turn to
Snow and Decided Drop in
Temperature Will Take
Place Tonight.

Washington, March 5.—The March blizzard which overpassed the middle west yesterday with snow and heavy tempests will reach the Atlantic coast tonight, the weather bureau predicted today. The force of the blizzard has been disseminated in gales, and although the entire nation has western seaboard today will turn to snow. The fall will be light but will be followed by older weather.
