

## LABOR DELEGATES FOR WAGE BOARD IS GIVEN TO WILSON

List of Nominations Submitted to President for Approval

### OTHER GROUPS HAVE NOT MADE SELECTION

President Will Choose Three Names Out of Ten—Senate Must Confirm Nomination—Shop Crafters Nominate Two Members.

Washington, March 11.—The list of nominations to the national labor board, wage board of appeals, was submitted to the president for approval today. The list consists of ten names, three from the labor union groups, three from the shop crafters and four from the public.

The shop crafters group, which includes the plumbers, pipe fitters, electricians, and other trades, nominated two members. The labor union groups, including the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners, the International Brotherhood of Teamsters, and the International Union of Marine and Shipbuilding Workers, nominated three members.
