Raleigh, Aug. 9.—The special session of the North Carolina legislature called primarily for the purpose of fixing constitutional tax limitations under the revaluation act passed by the session last year and which will take up the suffrage amendment will convene here at 11 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Governor Bickett will deliver his message in person to the body tomorrow as soon as it is called to order. He is expected to mention the suffrage amendment in his address tomorrow but will address the body on this subject at a later session. It is understood that the governor will wait for the legislature to meet in special session Friday for the purpose of taking up the question of revaluation of the suffrage amendment.
