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THOMASVILLE GUILD OF POLICE IS SHOWN BY J. W. PEACOCK

Prominent Physician Alleged to Have Done Shooting on Principal Street

ILL FEELING CITED AS CAUSE OF AFFAIR

Dr. Peacock's Friends Think He Believed Taylor Responsible for Fire Last Night—Bystander Is Seriously Injured

High Point, April 16.—Chief of Police J. E. Taylor, of Thomasville, five miles west of here, was shot and instantly killed this morning at 9:30 by Dr. J. W. Peacock, prominent physician of Thomasville. The shooting occurred on the principal street of Thomasville. Henry Shaver, was seriously injured when he was struck by a stray bullet. He was brought to a local hospital for treatment.

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
