

Germany Has Another Reparations Proposal Nearer Allies Demand.

Terms of Proposal Declared to Provide Payment of 200,000,000 Gold Marks

ECONOMIC PLEDGES OF PAYMENT OFFERED

New Offer Inclines More Toward Allied Demands at Paris Conference Than to Dr. Simons' First Proposal at London Conference.

Berlin, April 25.—The payment by Germany of two hundred billion gold marks for reparations is roughly the proposal submitted by Germany to the allies according to terms of the agreement. The payment will be spread over a period of from thirty to fifty years or more according to Germany's economic recovery.

Economic pledges in the way of goods and participation in various German industries was offered as a guarantee of the payment of the debt.

WILL OCCUPY COAL FIELD IF PROPOSAL IS REJECTED

London, April 25.—Mr. Lloyd George, the British premier, stated in the House of Commons that the allies are not prepared to accept the latest German reparations proposal.
