Allied Ultimatum Sets May 12 As Time Limit For Germany's Answer

Categorical Answer as to Payment of Reparations Must be Made Then

MILITARY AND NAVAL MEASURES ARE LIKELY

Allied Leaders Hand Ultimatum at German Ambassador to London—Protocol Forwarded to War Commission at Paris

London, May 5.—The allied ultimatum issued to Germany today assumed, her to reply categorically by May 12 at the latest whether she will perform her manifold obligations under the treaty of Versailles, primarily as to the payment of reparations to the allied powers. Should Germany fail to comply, the allies give notice that they will proceed on May 12 with organization of the Ruhr Navy and to undertake all other military and naval measures. The terms for Germany's payment of their debt to the allies are to be given her by the allied reparations committee to-morrow.

Meanwhile the allies are continuing with all necessary preliminaries for the occupation of the Ruhr. The ultimatum was handed to Dr. Stoeber, the German ambassador in London, this morning. The protocol to be handed the German war bondholders commission in Paris, brought by the reparations commission says "Germany will perform its little manner laid down in this schedule of obligations to pay the total sum in accordance with Article 231 of the treaty of Versailles, 1,620,000,000 gold marks less, the amount already paid on account of reparations."

(b) Sums which we from time to time have credited to Germany in respect of State property in ceded territory, etc., etc. Any sums received from further enemy or former enemy powers in respect to which the commission may have received credits may be given to Germany plus the Belgian debts to the allies, the amounts of less deductions to be determined by the commission later.

DOKIE CEREMONIAL UNDER WAY TODAY

Numerous Visitors are in City For Gala Occasion Staged by Wearers of the Fez

Following the arrival this morning of the Divan from Charlotte and the influx of veterans and tyros from various sections of eastern Carolina, the big Dokie ceremonial, to which local Dokies have been looking forward with such anticipation, is under way in the city today. It is expected that there will be approximately 100 visitors here before the ceremonial proper gets into wing later in the day.

The D. O. K. K. headquarters are being maintained at the Masonic Temple where the numerous candidates are registering this morning. After the registration has been completed, the veterans and tyros will assemble at 12:30 at headquarters where cars will be provided to carry them to the county club. A sumptuous barbecue dinner will be served there at 1 o'clock while the stunt committee, of which C. W. Cogdill is chairman, will take charge of the tyros and provide the fun for the veterans as allies at the dinner.

Following the stunt work, the visitors will be taken on an automobile ride over the city, while at 5:30 all the local Dokies and visitors will assemble at the Sagamore club and march to headquarters in the Masonic building. At 6:00 o'clock an elaborate banquet will be served in the Masonic banquet hall, and then at 7:30 the ceremonial proper will get underway in the auditorium of the Masonic temple with a class of approximately 50 candidates on hand to receive the degrees.

While the Divan of Suez Temple from Charlotte is here for the ceremonial, the local brigand team, which was organized several weeks ago and has been drilling twice a week since its organization under the captaincy of Edwin Powell, will likewise take a prominent part in the ceremonial. The entire city is joining the local Dokies in extending a welcome to the visitors.

ASHEVILLE MAY BE CONVENTION CITY

Record growth of church will be reflected in reports to Baptist Meeting

Chattanooga, Tenn., May 5.—Asheville, N.C., will be chosen as one of the cities to be chosen as regular meeting places for the sessions of the Southern Baptist Convention in the fall, in the event the session of that body—which meets here May 12—is deferred again because of rising rates of tuberculosis among preachers and ministers from year to year. This policy is being warmly advocated by many because of the inability of men of the faith of the South to provide ample hotel facilities for accommodating the thousands of delegates attending the convention. It is generally conceded that Asheville has both the spirituality and hotel capacity for accommodating the thousands of delegates and its location is also considered to be ideal.

Indicating the rapid growth that has come to Southern Baptists in recent years, figures compiled by the state secretary of the Convention show that since the last meeting here in 1908 the number of members of local churches affiliating with the convention has been increased by 1,250,000. While the total number of members for this year are not yet available, it is believed that during the duration of the 1916 and last year's sessions in Washington, the number of Sunday schools has grown from 1,000 to 17,000, the number of pupils from 857,244 to 1,653,500, the value of local church property from \$458,132 to \$73,275,225, contributions to missions \$6,675 to \$7,312,266.55, and the total contributions to all causes from \$91,283.41 to \$12,273,466.67.

This year promises to be a new record in contributions all along the line, despite depressed conditions, because it will mark the close of the second year of the \$5 million campaign.

WOULD BRING NEW OFFICE TO CITY

Movement on foot for Establishment of Public Employment Bureau in Rocky Mount

Rocky Mount will have a public employment office, operated jointly by the city and the state, if the efforts of J. H. Lucas, who has been conducting a successful private employment bureau here for some time, are carried to materialization.


Realizing the need for such a bureau here, Mr. Lucas has taken the question of its establishment up with W. L. Shipman, state commissioner of labor and printing, having even gone so far as to make a trip to Raleigh to discuss the possibilities of securing state aid.

As the result of his conference with Mr. Shipman and correspondence with the state officials in regard to the project, the state has practically pledged its cooperation and financial assistance, in compliance with the recent measure adopted by the 1921 session of the legislature, provided the county or city will share jointly in bearing the expenses of the bureau.
