

Tar Heels Take Suffolk Tigers Into Camp at First Fray Score 5-3

Suffolk, Va., June 7.—Unable to overcome the lead gained when Pitcher Slappy went wild in the first inning this afternoon, Suffolk lost the first game of the series with Rocky Mount by the score of 5 to 3.

Burns put in when Slappy went to the showers and pitched what would ordinarily be winning ball but crippled conditions when a pitcher playing in rightfield, and plays which should have been going as hits was unable to come through on the right side.

Loach pitching for Rocky Mount aided by Champlin, Kelliber and Steinback at bat and a few other heavy hitters came out victorious although Suffolk staged a comeback in the last of the game.

London, June 5.—Shouting questions as to what was being done to solve the problem of unemployment, and making speeches concerning the coal strike, extremists at the Plastow trade union meeting last night endeavored to interrupt the visit of King George and Queen Mary there Saturday.

More conservative members of the union drowned out the disturbers by singing "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow." The element which sought to break up the visit was later expelled.
