The Japanese team, which has a record of 357 games won and 143 lost, will play its first game here on Saturday at 6:30 p. m. at the University of Chicago's stadium.

ALDERMEN MAKE TOUR OF THE CITY TODAY

Starting from the municipal building, where they are supposed to meet at three o'clock, the members of the board of aldermen will put aside the city and worry of private business this afternoon and devote several hours to making a complete survey of the city and inspecting municipal conditions in the interest of the general public.

The tour is made at the suggestion of Mayor Gay which was offered and unanimously adopted at the last aldermen meeting. Not only will every nook and cranny of the city be visited by the official automobile caravan, but the various municipal plants will come in for a visit and close inspection by the city fathers. In making the tour and inspection the aldermen believe they will become much better acquainted with conditions over the city and be in much better shape to make and act upon public improvement recommendations, such as gas, water, light and sewer, extensions or additional paving.

Every member of the board is expected to make the tour, while various city officials, including the chief of police, the superintendent of public works, the superintendent of the gas department, the city attorney, and others, will likewise make the pilgrimage which will be headed by Mayor Gay.

LARGE ARMY GARRISON STATIONED IN HAWAII

Honolulu, T. H., June 23.—More than 15,000 officers and men of the United States army compose the present garrison in Hawaii, according to recent, semi-official tables complete here. That this total will be brought to approximately 25,000 is the confident expectation in well-informed circles.

The last important unit to arrive was the 55th artillery, with its equipment of heavy motorized guns. These troops came during May and are quartered at Fort Kamehameha near Pearl Harbor, the navy's great base in the islands.

HAWAIIAN SUGAR FAR BEHIND IN SHIPMENTS

Honolulu, T. H., May 31 (Delayed)—Sugar shipments from Hawaii were approximately 100,000 tons behind schedule at the end of May, according to official figures compiled by the sugar factories. Up to May 23 there had been a total of 211,925 tons of the 1921 crop sent to the mainland. By the end of April last year there had been 290,036 tons shipped out of the islands. It is estimated that the total crop of the islands this year will be 455,700 tons.
