

Attorney General's Plea For Injunction Granted By Court

Judge Wilkinson Grants Nation-wide Injunction Against Rail Strikers

TEMPORARY ORDER IS TO BE SIGNED MONDAY

Court Holds That Defendants Cannot Deny Knowledge and Responsibility For Widespread Acts of Strike Violence

Chicago, Sept. 23.—Judge James H. Wilkinson today granted Attorney General Daugherty's petition for a nation-wide temporary injunction against the striking railway shopmen.

Judge Gives Review Judge Wilkinson in a lengthy review of the case said the defendants could not deny knowledge and responsibility for acts of violence which were widespread and which were not confined to the strike.

The court gave attorneys for the defendants until Monday morning at 10 o'clock to prepare the rest of the injunction order which will be signed by Attorney General Daugherty. The order has provided that the defendants shall be held in custody until they have complied with the order.
