

... until he shall pay the fine and fees of prosecution— And upon the conviction of having issued two grants on the original and duplicate warrants to the Blounts, the following sentence was passed—That he the said James Glasgow, pay a fine of 1000 pounds and that he stand committed to Newbern jail without bail or mainprize until the fine and fees were paid.

The court passed the following sentence on Willoughby Williams, convicted as mentioned in our last— That he pay a fine of 500 pounds, and stand committed to Newbern jail, until he pay the fine and fees. The following sentence was passed on John Bonds— That he pay a fine of 100 pounds, and that he stand committed to Halifax jail without bail or mainprize until he pay his fine and costs.

The trial of Thomas Blount which we mentioned in our last was to have come on, and for which Mr. B. until a third bill was found, was so anxious, was postponed upon his making and filing an affidavit stating that Willie Blount of Tennessee, was a material witness for him, and that he had expectations of procuring his attendance in a short time; which being held sufficient by the court, he and his brother John Gray Blount were bound over to appear at Newbern court on the 15th July next, to answer the charges before stated. Mr. T. Blount previous to this trial he affidavit that if he could not find a material witness, he would not venture whether they would or would not admit such testimony, and Mr. B. not being willing to risk his trial upon the uncertainty of the reception of the evidence of a brother, who was charged with the same offences, filed the affidavits above stated, upon which his trial was postponed.

The trial of Wynn Dixon was postponed upon affidavit, stating the absence of a material witness who had been for the court, but by accident was prevented from attending: He was bound over to Hillsborough Superior Court, to be held on the 6th of October next.

Philadelphia, June 16. A gentleman who left Baltimore last Thursday, informs that dispatches from the American commissioners at Paris had been received there, and sent on the President at the city of Washington, and last evening it was said that a vessel had arrived at Baltimore, direct from France, with an account of a treaty having been concluded, &c. &c. give these merely as reports, and shall only observe that the Bulletin paper of Friday is sent on the subject.

Extract of a letter from the city of Washington, June 5. "The president of the United States has arrived here, and taken up his quarters at Foulwell's hotel. He was received with the greatest respect by the inhabitants of this city."

It gives us much pleasure to see the officers of government coming in so freely in the season, as the confidence of the inhabitants of this place will be strengthened, and every exertion made for the comfortable accommodation of all classes of citizens who may think proper to settle on the most beautiful situation the United States afford."

It is worthy the consideration of those who are making large shipments of flour to Great Britain, and who on the faith of the act of Parliament granting bounties, &c. may be induced to adventure at extravagant prices, that the act which gives a liberty to the Parliament of (at any time during the session) altering, varying or repealing, any part of the said act.

At this season of the year, there is much risk to be apprehended from the flag lowering, and unless extra care, serious losses may accrue from this circumstance, as none is entitled to the bounty but what is merchantable.

For the information of ship owners. By the third section of the registering act passed on the 31st of Dec. 1792, it is required, that every ship or vessel, hereafter to be registered (except as is herein after provided) shall be registered by the collector of the district, in which shall be comprehended, the port to which such ship or vessel shall belong at the time of her registry, which port shall be deemed to be that at or nearest to which, the owner, if there be but one, or if more than one, the husband or acting and managing owner of the ship or vessel, usually resides, and the name of the said ship or vessel, en-

and of the port to which she shall belong, shall be painted on her stern, on a black ground, in white letters of not less than 3 inches in length.— And if any ship or vessel of the U. States, shall be found without having her name, and the name of the port to which she belongs, painted in manner aforesaid, the owner or owners shall forfeit 50 dollars; one half to the person giving the information thereof, the other half to the use of the United States.

On this law the several collectors, naval officers, and surveyors in the Union, have lately received the following remarks and instruction from the treasury department, viz. "This requisite of the law (which is equally applicable to enrolled and licensed vessels) I have reason to apprehend is in some districts not complied with according to its obvious meaning and intention, by having such name painted on the permanent plank of the stern of the vessel, but that in lieu of it, the painting is executed on a loose piece of board or canvas, and attached by means of nails or otherwise, to the stern, which by being easily removed, and again replaced at pleasure, may be perverted to improper uses. Merely calling your attention to this requisite of the law, will I confess, be insufficient to prevent the repetition of a practice so unexcusable, or to induce you to enforce the penalty which its violation will incur."
