The advertisement I directed you to insert in your paper some time ago, would appear according to Mr. Cutlar's piece in answer thereto, to be without foundation; you will therefore publish the inclosed Bill of Sale, which I suppose to be the same he refers to in that publication, and is the authority I had for saying he sold the Negroes to Mobley, which I do really suppose is good authority—If it is not, I am much mistaken and others also.

It will evidently appear by the Bill of Sale, that Mr. Cutlar conveyed the Negroes to Mr. Mobley not to return to him except he paid the money therein mentioned, by the time limited, which he has not done.—What reason can be given to exonerate Mr. Cutlar from the fulfilment of his bargain so firmly and unequivocally entered into, I cannot imagine.

The event of the suit I shall commence against Mr. Cutlar for the Negroes, will prove the matter better than any thing he or I can say.

My advertisement was not intended nor I presume calculated to offend Mr. Cutlar or defame his character, as he concludes; but simply to keep the Negroes together, so that I might have fewer law suits and less trouble in the recovery of them. Mr. Cutlar, (as he says) having as long or longer residence in this part of the country than myself, must surely be conclusive evidence of the purity of his character, or else a more extensive acquaintance.

KNOW all men by these presents, that I Roger Cutlar of New-Hanover county, State of North-Carolina, have (for and in consideration of the sum of Two Hundred Pounds specie to me in hand paid, the receipt thereof I bear by a knowledge, and myself therewith to be fully satisfied and paid) bargained, sold and delivered, and by these presents bargain, sell and deliver unto Biggars Mobley of the same aforesaid, county of Sampson, Three Negroes, to wit, a Negro Weuch Matilda and her Two Children Rose and Solomon—To have and to hold the said bargained Negroes to the said Mobley, his heirs and assigns for ever.

Further—The lawful right of said Negroes to the said Mobley, his heirs and assigns, I bind myself, my heirs, executors, administrators, to warrant and for ever defend against the lawful claim of any person or persons whatever.

Provided nevertheless, if the said Cutlar does well and truly pay or cause to be paid unto the said Mobley, his heirs, executors, administrators or assigns, on or before the first day of December next, Two Hundred and Fifty Pounds specie, then said Mobley binds himself to return said Negroes to said Cutlar, if alive.
