

igned that the brave militia men of Kentuckey would not, with eager footsteps, press on at the summons of patriotism and military glory. They seek not wealth by war; they are not a body of mercenaries who fight only for pay. Their country knows it and accepts their services as a gratuitous pledge of their patriotism. But unwilling that they should suffer by their zeal, she offers them the same pay as she gives to the regular troops of the United States. They seek not blood and plunder. Though treaties were violated,—though their rights were infringed; though their commerce was at an end, they sought not redress by violence—they relied on their government; it did them justice and they were satisfied. But if treaties cannot still be maintained without force; if their government, after trying in vain the influence of truth, and relying in vain on the power of justice, summon them to arms, they are ready. They envy not the tranquility of their neighbours; they aim not to enrich themselves with their spoils—but they will fight for their own. They will assert the honour of their nation; they will support the dignity of their government, and the claims of justice."

The following particulars of the loss of the brig Molly, appears in a Norfolk paper of December 20.

The brig Molly, captain William Mills, belonging to Mr. Patton of Alexandria, sailed from Kingston, Jamaica, on the 24th of November, having on board 42 French passengers, and their baggage, on the 11th of December, at half past ten P. M. being about three miles to the southward of Currituck Inlet, during a heavy squall of wind and rain, the vessel struck the ground, and in about twenty minutes went to pieces. The situation of the wreck was such, that every individual was left to make the best shift he could for himself; the captain and four of the crew, as well as nineteen passengers were drowned; the remainder were saved by means of the quarter deck, which drifted ashore. A number of trunks were cast ashore and were gathered together. Application was made to Mr. Thomas Williams, a justice of the peace for that neighbourhood, for protection, who appointed one Caleb Everidge to take charge of and guard the property; this trust he humbly executed, by confining at the robbery of three trunks and a writing desk, containing valuables to an immense amount. Other property was also stolen from the passengers, who were all treated in the most unkind and inhospitable manner. It is to be lamented, that individuals should be appointed to dispense justice, whose hearts are callous to the feelings of compassion for the deplorable condition of the ship wrecked stranger.
