This sum exceeds one hundred and eighty millions of dollars; is more than double the entire amount of our national debt; and is seventeen times the amount of the taxes laid by the general government. It operates as a tax of fifteen dollars upon every man, woman and child in the kingdom, and of more than one hundred dollars upon every family.

The navy costs fifty-three millions.

The army costs one hundred millions.

The poor are oppressed not only by the direct weight of the taxes, but likewise by the increased price of all the necessaries of life occasioned by more than a million of hands being taken from the plough or the work shop.

On these facts we make no comments.--- Every American will appreciate their importance; will acknowledge, with gratitude, the unvalued happiness of his own country, and will reverence with increased ardor, the superiority of republicanism to monarchical institutions.

The following is a translated copy of a letter addressed by Gen. Dessalines to an American supercargo, who had taken the liberty of remonstrating against certain oppressive agents of the administration of Hayti:

Head Quarters, July 14--first year of the Independence of Hayti.

The Administrator Bayard has just caused to be put into thy hands the menacing letter you wrote him, Sir.

The people of your country, who wish to come to this island for the purpose of opening a store, or merely to sell their cargoes, shall always find safety and protection.

I will however, by no means suffer, Sir that a stranger shall enter a port contrary to the measures I have taken for the interest of my country, nor that he shall be permitted to insult the representatives of government in that part of their service.

There are established in every city merchants of this country, as well as those of your own nation, who have the right of treating with you for your cargoes, and of selling afterwards to the store-keepers of the place. I forbid a foreigner on entering our ports having this privilege, or that of purchasing produce from the hands of individuals, to the detriment of the administration, or the merchants already established; and I am careful that this order is executed.

The honorable and loyal manner in which we have treated your nation, has already obtained me a name, and I shall always be able to find honest men (and that in great numbers) who will bring to this country whatever we stand in need of.

I have the honor to salute you.
