It was even said at Lisbon, that these proceedings, and this determination of the Court of Spain, had already been announced at the Court of St. James's.

A gentleman who left Paris, on the 11th, and Rotterd mon the 18th, announces, as a rumour in France and Holland that the Emperor of Russia has intimated to the Court of Copenhagen, that in the event of a rupture with France, his imperial Majesty could not suffer any French agents to reside in the Danish dominions, or endure, upon the part of Denmark, a neutrality that must be injurious to Europe. A declaration nearly to the same effect is said to have been made to the Ottoman Porte by the Russian Ambassador at Constantinople.

CONGRESS.

House of Representatives, November 14.

The Speaker laid before the House a letter from Duncan M Farland, relating to the contested election of Mr. Purviance from North-Carolina, referred to the Committee of Elections.

The Speaker also laid before the house a letter from the Secretary of the Navy enveloping a report on the navy pension fund, which was ordered to be printed.

Mr. Crowningshield presented the petition of Simeon Noyes, an old revolutionary soldier and non-commissioned officer, who was disabled in the service by wounds and sickness, who altho' admitted on the pension list by the Judges of 1792, has never received any assistance from the United States, and praying a pension may be allowed him to enable him to support himself, his wife and eight children; on motion this petition was referred to a select committee of three, but on motion of

Mr. J. C. Smith, the question was reconsidered, and it was referred to the committee of claims.

Gen. Varnum moved that the committee be instructed to consider at large the subject relative to invalid pensioners & the situation of all persons who were wounded or disabled in the service of the United States, during our revolutionary war with Great-Britain, and what further me sures are necessary to render them such ample remuneration as justice may require; ordered that the committee be instructed accordingly.

Dr. Leib mentioned to the house the condition in which the public buildings (the arsenal at Philadelphia) the property of the U. States were: one of the sections was raised to the first floor, and some other parts were left unfinished, indeed all the uncovered parts of the buildings were more or less suffering dilapidation or going to decay; he thought it would be found prudent to finish them in order to preserve them. He therefore moved that a committee be appointed to enquire-into the expediency of making provision by law for the completion of the public buildings belonging to the United States, near Philadelphia. Referred to a select committee of three members.

Mr. G. W. Campbell moved to instruct the committee appointed on that part of the President's Message which relates to the enlargement of the capital employed in commerce with the Indian tribes, to enquire into what alterations and amendments are necessary to the laws regulating trade and intercourse with the Indian tribes, and preserving peace on the frontiers, with leave to report by bill or otherwise. Agreed to.

Mr. M. Clay presented the petition of the stock-holders of the Alexander Marine Insurance Company, praying to be authorised to make insurance on houses, &c. from loss by fire: referred to a select committee of three.

Mr. J. Randolph moved the order of the day on the bill making farther appropriation for carrying into execution the treaty between the U. States and Great-Britain.

Mr. J. C. Smith in the chair. The blank was filled with 70,000 dollars, the committee then rose and reported the bill.

The house agreed to the same as reported and ordered it to be engrossed for a third

A message from the President of the United States was received, accompanied by the report of the Secretary of the Navy communicating the documents requested by the house relative to the affair of the Intrepid Ketch under the command of Capt. Decatur, who it was announced had been promoted to the rank of Captain in the Navy of the United States. Ordered to be printed.

Mr. Alston moved to refer the act of North-Carolina, authorising the state of Tennessee to perfect titles to lands reserved to that state by the cession act, to a select committee of five, with leave to report by bill or otherwise. Agreed to.

Dr. Mitchell made a report from the committee of commerce and manufactures on the petition of the State Companies of New-York and Dutchess counties, concluding that any additional duty on imported state at this time will be inexpedient. The general principle upon which this report was bottomed, being of considerable importance, and likely to excite discussion, he moved to refer it to a committee of the whole, and that it be made the order for Tuesday next; agreed and in the mean time ordered to be printed.

Mr. Newton stated a fact relative to a citizen'of Georgia, who had been sued in that state; but the coeditor finding the citizen was coming to Washington, dissurissed his suit there, and procured his arrest here. The debtor as a stranger, for want of hail must have gone to prison, but through the humanity of the murshal who accompanied him to several places in the territory in search of a friend, the debtor was fortunate enough to procure the requisite security, and thereby avoided the hardships of imprisonment .-to prevent in future this species of oppression to which strangers are liable, be moved that a select committee of five be appointed to enquire whether any, and if any, what alterations are necessary to be made in the laws of the discrict of Columbia relative to holding. persons to buil, and that they be authorised to report by bill or otherwise.

the county of Washington, Rhode-Island, praying a light-house may be erected on Watch-hill point: and another from Stonington, in connexion for a similar purport, was referred to the committee of commerce and manufactures with leave to report by bill or otherwise. Adjourned.

November 16.

The engrossed bill making farther appropriation for carrying into effect the treaty of amity commerce and navigation between the United States and Great-Britain was read a third time and passed.

Mr. R. Griswold moved for the appointment of a committee to enquire what further provision ought to be made by law for the encouragement of the fisheries of the United States; the motion was carried; and the report on this subject made at the last session was referred to the same.

Mr. Jackson moved for the appointment of a committee to consider of the making provision for the application of the money heretofore appropriated for laying out and making certain public roads. A committee of five was

appointed.

Mr. Kennedy presented a petition from a number of the inhabitants of Rosnoke, &c. in North-Carolina, praying a port of entry may be established at the town of Plymouth, referred to the committee already appointed on this subject.

Mr. Finley from the committee of elections, reported that the members who had been returned in the place of those who had resigned or deceased were entitled to take their seats.

RALEIGH, November 26.

Our present Governor, James Turner, Esq. was, on Saturday morning, re-elected to that office the ensuing year, by all the votes of the General Assembly except one.

To-morrow (Tuesday) is fixed for electing a Senator of the United States for this State, in the place of Jesse Franklin who is again in nomination.

It will have been seen, from the communication of the Governor to the General Assembly (inserted in our last) that, by the convention entered into between the United States and Georgia in 1802, that that part of the territory ceded by S. Carolina to the General Government, which lies west of the Blue Ridge of Mountains, and south of the southern boundary of North-Carolina and Tennessee, was ceded to Georgia. According to a survey made by Georgia, this territory includes part of Buncombe county. Application was made to this State to have the boundary-line run; but S. Carolina not having acted on the subject, and our Legislature not having been in session since, this could not be effected. Georgia, we understand, without waiting for the demarkations being ascertained under the authority of the two States, has proceeded to take possession of that territory, form it into a county, hold a court, &c. and the officers of Buncombe have been resisted in the execution of their duty. The citizens of that county, however, unwilling to see their territory usurped in this way, rose and drove off the Georgians by force.

We trust that the Legislatures of the 2 States will take such steps as shall be the means of removing the present disagreeable state of things in that quarter.

November 22.

At 12 o'clock to day, his I acellency the Governor attends the General Assembly to take the oaths of office.

The balloting for a Senator of the United States for this state has also been postponed to this day. The gentlemen in nomination are Major Jesse Franklin, General Montfort Stokes, General Thomas Blount and General Benjamin Smith.

On the 22d inst. a new house of Judge Taylor, in the upper part of Newbern, was discovered to be on fire, which was burnt to ashes. The exertions of the citizens saved the adjacent buildings.

The Legislature of South-Carolina met on Monday the 26th inst.

The Legislature of Georgia; the Legislatures of the States of New-York, New-Jersey and Rhode-Island, are now in session.

Capt. Cobb, arrived at Boston in 25 days from Berbice, informs, that the coffee crop was entirely cut off, owing to the long dry season, and the rainy season setting in severely. Estates that used to produce 200,000 lb. of coffee, will not this year produce 100,000 lbs. The produce has yet to grow that they intend to ship to meet the bills they pay Americans in. The Governor had refused to let them take away produce for those bills which come back protested.

COMMERCIAL.

Extract from the Madrid Gazette of the 20th July, 1804.

A Royal Decree has been issued under date of the 21st of June, as follows: "As it is the Royal will to encourage, by

"As it is the Royal will to encourage, by all possible means, the Direct Commerce of all the established ports in Spain with the American colonies and national marine, His Majesty has determined that considering the subsisting grants and privileges allowed to some individuals relative to this Commerce, in future no other instance shall be admitted, of any or whatever nature it may! at and that it shall be so manifested and made known to the Consulates, in order that with this assurance the merchants may now safely speculate and undertake the expedition.

Philadelphia, Nov. 19.

A gentleman of respectability informs us, that he has just received advices from Point-Petre, (G.) through a confidential friend, stating, that a privateer, called the Granville, mounting 28 guns and 2 thirty-six pounders, with a compliment of 280 men, beisdes seamen and marines, each armed with a musket, had arrived there with orders to take all American vessels bound to Hispaniola, and hang the crews as pirates. The Grandville was one of a fleet of well-armed ships daily expected at Point-Petre, in order to cruize for Americans bound to Hispaniola.

The brother of the King of France sailed on Wednesday last, with a fair wind, for Gottenburg, under convoy of a gun-brig. Previous to his departure he received a letter from his Most Christain Majesty, which is understood to contain an assurance that the Emperor of Russia and the King of Sweden are willing to acknowledge Louis XVIII. and his hereditary claims to the throne of France and Navarre, provided England will set them the example.
