

whirlwind squall, and remained in that situation for four days, when she righted after losing both masts. On the fifth day was taken off the wreck (having remained the whole time without any kind of sustenance) by the brig Adventure, Capt. Pimpless, bound to Halifax, and treated with the utmost kindness. After remaining on board 8 or 9 days, upon short allowance, the Adventure was also entirely dismantled, and on the 20th was put on board the Two Friends, Capt. Martin, from New-Orleans bound to Philadelphia, who sent him ashore to this place.
