New-York, March 22.

**Foreign Intelligence.**—By the arrival of the ship John Morgan, from Liverpool, we have received London dates to the 12th ult. The new ministry, from whom much is justly expected, have commenced their career. Parliament has been occupied almost exclusively with the treaties entered into by government with the powers on the continent—Austria, Russia, Sweden, &c. and other state papers. Boulogne has again become the scene of preparation. The flotilla is immediately to be augmented, the 'camp of the ocean' to be formed anew, and the invasion of England is once more "the order of the day."

**Expectation of another naval engagement.**—When Captain Bunker left Liverpool, government was in hourly expectation of a decisive engagement having taken place between the English fleet under Sir Richard Strachan, and a French fleet of nine sail of the line and several frigates, in lat 47, long 4. The captain of an American vessel, lately arrived there, reported that he had been brought to by the English fleet off Cape Acar, then within four hours sail of the enemy.

On the 31st ultimo, in Congress, the injunction of secrecy imposed on the members in January last, during the proceedings with closed doors, was taken off, by a majority of seven votes.

In the National Intelligencer of the 2d inst. are published Details of the proceedings of the House of Representatives of the United States, during the secret sittings in January last.

The transactions with closed doors, terminated in the adoption of a bill, (76 to 54) empowering the President to purchase of Spain the territories lying on the Atlantic Ocean and Gulf of Mexico and eastward of the Mississippi; and appropriating two millions of dollars therefor.

On the 26th ult. the bill prohibiting the importation of certain (British) goods, wares and merchandise, passed the House of Representatives by a majority of 61 votes.
