The London Statesman of the 2d ult. contains the proceedings of the French Conservative Senate, on the 3d of October, consisting of an Address of the Archchancellor of the Empire, and a report made to the Emperor by the Minister of War Sept. 15. previous to the peace with Austria. One passage in this document deserves notice—After speaking of a previous determination to assemble in the interior of France, whatever might be the complexion of affairs, the Youth of France; it is added, that "The temporary dereliction of his system would be productive of some danger to the Empire." &c.

The Minister of War further observes that "The English Ministers who preceded the members of the present government, a more able set of men than the latter, were convinced, that every serious attempt on the Continent, on the part of the English, is a step towards a general Peace." "Every man of good sense may predict a general peace to be near at hand, if the English persist in a continental contest."

FOREIGN ARTICLES. LONDON, Nov. 3. Lord Wellington will be seen as at Lisbon on the 23d but was about to join the army, and a Russian man of war has been burnt at Lisbon. Geronas still holds out.

An opinion prevailed in Holland, that Buonaparte was extremely dissatisfied with the Emperor Alexander; and that he had, on more than one occasion, expressed in public his feelings on this subject. His jealousy of Russia, and the fear that she might combine with Austria against him, have determined him not to march any of the army of Germany into Spain.

We are favored with the following from a friend in London:—You may depend on Lord Wellesley having refused to become a member of the cabinet, unless Mr. Canning formed a part of the administration. Mr. R. Milnes, member of Parliament, was pressed by Mr. Perceval to accept the Chancellorship of the exchequer, but refused.—This I have from good authority. [York Herald.]

The port of Havana was open on the 30th Nov. and the property stored in the Custom house store, ordered to be delivered to the consignees.

FOREIGN FREEDOM OF THE SEAS.

Lloyd's List, Oct. 10.—The Madison, Frost, from Baltimore, is carried into Dieppe. The Mary, Cullen, from Waterford, to London, was taken about 16 days since, by the Duke of Berg, privateer near Heeschy, and carried into Dieppe. A West Indian man was taken about the same time. The Gamecock, Enlers, from Plymouth to Heligoland; the Experiment, Al'Alphin, from Montserrat to London; the Three Sisters, King, from Poole to Hull; the Adjutor, Ellis, from Lisbon to London; the Hope, Currie, from Oporto to London; the Apollo,

Schinkel, from Bordeaux to Petersburg; the John and Grace, Sen, from Cork to London; and the Madison, Frost, from Baltimore, are captured and carried into Dieppe.

Oct. 24.—The Mars, Salmon, from Boston to Gouenbourg, re-captured from the French on the 17th inst. by the Plover, and is arrived at Plymouth. At Gravesend, the Mary Ann, Virginia; Victory, Watson, Baltimore; Commerce, Virginia; & George, Johnson, N. York.

Oct. 27.—Arrived at Plymouth, the Brutus, Goodrich, from N. York, retaken from the French by the Medusa, frigate. Arrived at Galway, the Minerva, Spear, of Boston, for Lisbon—had been taken, by a French privateer, and retaken by the master and a passenger, from an officer, and TEN MEN. At Fowey, the Julia and Mary, of Richmond Virginia, also retaken from the French by the Busy brig.

The Susan, Walton, from the Weser, to Virginia, was taken the 15th inst. by the Plebruster, privateer, and carried to Calais. The ship Resolution, of N. York, from London, taken by a French privateer, and set on fire, was taken in with on the 14th of Oct. by a vessel from Liverpool for Surinam, a part of a crew put on board, and conducted into Liverpool.

NORFOLK, Dec 31.

Last night arrived in Hampton Roads, the ship Justina, Capt. Howe, 38 days from Liverpool. General Reubell and family, came passengers. November 19th, lat. 49, 20, long. 17, 30, was boarded by the French National brig, Genris, capt. Lagrave, 7 weeks from Norway—Detaine the ship two hours, and probably would have destroyed her, had it not been for the female passengers. The captain of the brig informed captain Howe, that his instructions were to destroy every American vessel from British ports, and that he had captured sixteen during his cruise.

NORTH-CAROLINA LEGISLATURE.

A few days before the two Houses rose the following patriotic Resolution was adopted: Resolved, That it be recommended by the Representatives of the free People of the State of North-Carolina, that the members who shall compose the next General Assembly, appear at the time of their said session, clothed entirely either in the Manufactures of this State, or of the U. States.

Resolved further, That it be the duty of the public Printer to bind up a copy of this Resolution in front of each of the acts of this Session.

The following Address to the President of the United States, was, on Saturday last, unanimously adopted in both Houses: TO JAMES MADISON, President of the United States.

SIR—The Legislature of North-Carolina assembled for the first time since you were called by the suffrages of your countrymen to preside over the councils of the country, feel it their duty, to the performance of which they cheerfully advance, to convey to you their unqualified approbation of the course which you have pursued, and which has so amply protected from injury the honor and dignity of the American government.

In times portentous and alarming as the present, when every salutary and equitable principle seems to be disregarded by the turbulent Nations of Europe, the citizens of the United States, unassisted by that firmness, wisdom and patriotism which have characterized your public conduct, would indeed have much to fear; but, cheered by the consoling belief that the American spirit, which has hitherto secured to us the benefits of your talents, will be always exerted in the advancement of our Country's happiness, we feel no hesitation in pledging ourselves individually, and as the Representatives of the Freeman of North-Carolina, to support, with energy, and at the risk of our lives and fortunes, such measures as the General government shall think proper to pursue, to protect from insult and aggression our common and happy country.

REPORTED FOR THE FEDERAL REPUBLICAN CONGRESS, HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Tuesday, Dec. 19.

Mr. Macon from the committee of foreign relations, reported a bill repealing the non-intercourse and making other regulations respecting commerce and navigation.

[The 1st section prohibits all public vessels belonging to Great Britain or France from entering the harbours of the United States, subject to certain specified exceptions. The 2d section prescribes the punishment of those who shall aid the infraction of this provision. The 3d section prohibits all vessels sailing under the flag of Great-Britain or France, or owned in whole or in part by any citizen of either, from entering the harbours of the United States. The 4th section prohibits the importation into the United States of goods from Great-Britain or Ireland, and France and their colonies; or of goods, from any foreign port which are the growth, produce or manufacture of Great-Britain or France; unless in vessels owned wholly by citizens of the United States. The above provisions to take immediate effect. The 5th section prohibits after the 15th of April next the importation of goods from Great Britain and France and their colonies unless imported directly therefrom.]
