Letters on French Influence, Weisten by Mr. Elliot, once a Republican member of Congress from the State of Vermont

To the people of the United States.
Having established the point that the

Having established the paint that the president of the LI. States has no constitutional right to impose an injunction of secrecy upon the two houses of congress, or either of them, in any case whatever, it is now proper to enquire into the power of those houses to lay such an injunction upon their own members.

The only power vested in the two branches es of the national legislature, by the constitution, which bears upon this subject, is contained in the third paragraph of the fifth action of the first article of the constitution, which article establishes and defines the legislative functions. "Each house shall keep a journal of its proceedings: and, from time to time, publish the same, excepting such parts as may in their judgment require secrecy: and the year and nays of the members of either house, on any question, shall at the devire of one fith of those present be entered on the journal." This paragraph is naturally connected with that which goes before it. "Each house may determine the rules of its proceedings; punish its members for disorderly behaviour; and with the concurrence of two thirds, expel a member." The provision in the present constitution respecting a secret journal, appears to have been in some measure derived rom the been in some measure derived rom the 7th section of the ninth article of the old confederation of the states, "The con-gress of the U. States shall have power to adjourn at any time within the year, and to any place within the U. States so that no any place within the II. States so that no period of adjournment be for a longer dustration than the space of six mionths, and shall publish the journal of their proceedings monthly, except such parts thereof relating to treaties, alliance, or military operations, as in their judgment require secrecy, and the yeas and nays of the delegates of each state on any question shall be entered on the journal, when it is desired by any delegate; and the delegates of the any delegate; and the delegates of the state, or any of them, at his or their reabove excepted, to lay before the legisla-tures of the several states."

As the old congress possessed the power of peace and war, with only a niere shadow of legislative powers generally, and the power of making treaties, now vested in the president and senate exclusively, the provision which has just been quoted from the articles of confederation, appears from the articles of confederation, appears to have been adopted with a view to the exercise of those powers upon the subjects of "treaties, alliances and military operations," and upon no other subjects. As it was the object of "The People," in establishing the new constitution, to "form a more perfect union," by the organization of a more energetic system of givernament, a power was given to each house to withhold from publication such parts of their proceedings as they should deem proper.
