A SHORT ACCOUNT OF THE LIFE OF MR. JAMES FERGUSON, Author of Lectures on Astronomy, &c. &c. &c.

I had a letter of recommendation from Mr. Deacon Edmund Fiddler, to the High School, from Stephen Pappas, Esq. of St. James's, who had been professor of the Royal High School in Edinburgh, Scotland, and was well known to the principal of all the good schools that had adorned his mind.

Soon afterwards it appeared to me, that although the moon goes round the earth, and that the sun is far on the outside of the moon's orbit, yet the moon's motion round us in a line that is always perpendicular to the plane of the earth's orbit, is a very singular phenomenon.

With such a character, and under such circumstances, Mr. Ferguson lived and died, and we should respect his talents and admit his exertions, and wish to see his steps.

It is not necessary to say, that the High School in Edinburgh, Scotland, was well known to the principal of all the good schools that had adorned his mind.

While he was thus employed, he was also engaged in the study of the natural sciences, and particularly in the study of the history of the earth.
