On Wednesday the 26th inst. an examination of the pupils at the Seminary commenced, it was attended by a numerous and highly respectable audience who expressed their flattering terms their approbation of the manner in which the young Ladies acquitted themselves. The honorable John L. Taylor, one of the Judges of the Supreme Court, Alexander Falconer, Esq. and Mr. William Gresham, principal of the Male Academy, presided. These first days were occupied in a strict examination of several classes in Spelling, Reading, Grammar, Penmanship, Geography, Astronomy, the use of the Celestial and Terrestrial Globes, History and the French Language. The copy books were exhibited, but the want of time prevented their examination in Arithmetic, for which many of the pupils had been prepared. The compositions of Miss McCall, of Wilmington, Misses Glover and Fitz of Warrenton, and Miss Adam of Fayetteville, were read to the audience by Judge Taylor, who at the close of the exercises delivered to the young Ladies, in behalf of himself and the gentlemen who presided, an eloquent and impressive address, expressing his satisfaction at the superior manner in which they had acquitted themselves. The morning of the third day was appropriated to a Musical performance by the pupils of Mr. Miller, who displayed great vocal proficiency. The number of pupils attending yesterday appeared blooming in health, and we state with pleasure, that there has not been an instance of sickness or indisposition during the session. The present spacious building, though pleasant and commodious, will be rendered more so during the vacation. The exercises of the day will recommence on Monday the 15th of July—each applicant will secure the admission of a few. The pupils will continue to receive instruction in all the branches above mentioned, Drawing and Needle work inclusive. Mr. Miller will necessarily be absent for some time, two substitutes well recommended as teachers of Music, Drawing and Painting have been provided, who will attend during Mr. M's absence. 50 DOLLARS REWARD.

RANAWAY from the subscriber's plantation on the 26th of May last, in Fairfield District, State of S. Carolina, two Negro men, named JACK and TARTON. Jack was brought from Maryland, by Mr. John Morton, about six or seven months ago, is about six feet high, stout and well made, of a black complexion, robust appearance, and somewhat of a sour and sullen look; he moves heavily and bends a little forward as he walks, and is about 30 years of age. A short time since his left hand he endeavored to pass under the name of Eric Jack. When he went off he wore a great coat of a dark grey colour, lined with red flannel, and edged with black velvet—he wore a pair of shoes made supper fashion, the rest of his clothes were various. Tarton is about 5 feet six or eight inches high, also of a black complexion, about 21 or 22 years of age, has a pleasant countenance, somewhat slow and hobbling in his walk; he lost his clothes or the greater part of them about 10 or 15 miles from home, therefore they cannot be described. He was brought about nine months ago from Mr. William Fuller of the city of Richmond, (Va.) and was raised in or near that city. They were both heard of about two weeks after their departure a little to the south of Salisbury, N. C. and were then without hats and their heads tied up with a napkin. It is supposed they will endeavour to reach the city of Richmond as their first refuge. TREASURY DEPARTMENT, May 28th, 1811.

PROCLAMATION

By the Governor of the State of North Carolina.

WHEREAS by an Inquest taken at the house of Jeremiah Gaddy, in Anson County, on the fourth day of the present month, before Adam Lockart, Coroner thereof, upon the view of the body of John May, then and there lying dead, it appears that a certain Richard Fair Crawford, late of the said County, feloniously, voluntarily, and of his malice aforethought, did discharge a gun loaded with forty or fifty shot, which entered in and upon the left part of the belly of the said John May, and made a mortal wound, whereby he instantly died; and that the said criminal has made his escape; and it being further represented that the murder was most cruel and unprovoked—that the criminal has fled beyond or out of the jurisdiction of this State—and that from the large connections and influence of the said Richard Fair Crawford, it is apprehended he will not be brought to justice without difficulty.—Now, therefore, I, Benjamin Smith, Governor of the State of North Carolina, pursuant to an act of the General Assembly passed at Raleigh, on the 26th Day of December, 1809, do hereby offer a reward of two hundred dollars to be paid to such person or persons as shall apprehend and bring said Richard Fair Crawford, and deliver him to the sheriff of Anson County, at the Jailhouse.

The aforesaid Richard Fair Crawford is described to me as being a very tall, sprightly man, five feet high, slender, robust, remarkably strong and nervous, his hair long and wavy, cheeks high; eyes large, prominent and grey; hair brown and worn short; shows his teeth when he laughs and chews tobacco.
