#### PROPOSALS

For carrying Mails of the United States on the following Post Roads will be received at the General Post Office in Washington City until the 29th day of August next, inclusive.

#### IN NORTH CAROLINA.

41. From Charlotte, Beattie's Ford, Lincolnton and Morgantown to Wilkesboro', to pass by Mount Morn every other trip once a week.

Leave Charlotte every Friday at 1 p.m. and arrive at Wilkesboro' on Monday by 6 p.m. Leave Wilkesboro' every Tuesday at 6 a.m. and arrive at Charlotte on Friday by 11 a.m.

#### NOTES.

1. The Post-master general may expedite the mails and alter the times for arrival and departure at any time during the continuance of the contract, he previously stipulating an adequate compensation for any extra expense that may be occasioned thereby.

2. Fifteen minutes shall be allowed for opening and closing the mail, at all offices where no particular time is specified.

3. For every thirty minutes delay (unavoidable accidents excepted) in arriving after the times prescribed in any contract, the contractor shall forfeit one dollar; and if the delay continue until the departure of any depending mail, whereby the mails destined for such depending mail lose a trip, a forfeiture of double the amount allowed for carrying the mail one trip shall be incurred, unless it shall be made to appear that the delay was occasioned by unavoidable accident; in which case the amount of pay for the trip will, in all cases, be forfeited and retained.

4. Persons making proposals are desired to state their prices by the year. Those who contract will receive their pay quarterly—in the months of February, May, August and November, one month after the expiration of each quarter.

5. No other than a free white person shall be employed to convey the mail.

6. When the proposer intends to convey the mail in his body of a stage carriage, he is desired to state it in his proposals.

7. The Post-master-general reserves to himself the right of declaring any contract at an end whenever one failure happens, which amounts to the loss of a trip.

8. The contracts are to be in operation on the 1st day of November next, and continue until December 31, 1814, for the routes No. 1 to 35 inclusive, and for the other routes to December 31, 1813.
