EXCHANGE OF OLD SIX PER CENT. AND DEFERRED STOCKS.

PURSUANT to the act of Congress, entitled "An act authorising a subscription for the old six per cent. & deferred stocks, and providing for the exchange of the same," passed on the 6th day of July, 1812, books will be opened on the first day of October next, at the Treasury, and at the several Loan Offices; and will continue open till the 17th day of March next, for receiving subscriptions of the old six per cent. and deferred stocks, in the manner prescribed by the said act.
