NOTES.

1. The Postmaster General may expedite the mails and alter the times for arrival and departure, at any time during the continuance of the contract, he previously stipulating an adequate compensation for any extra expense that may be occasioned thereby.
2. Fifteen minutes shall be allowed for opening and closing the mail, at all offices where no particular time is specified.
3. For every thirty minutes delay (unavoidable accidents excepted) in arriving after the times prescribed in any contract, the contractor shall forfeit one dollar; and

if the delay continues until the departure of any depending mail, whereas the mail destined for each depending office is to be forwarded double the amount allowed for carrying, and no more shall be incurred, unless it shall be made to appear that the delay was occasioned by unavoidable accidents, in which case, the amount of pay to the contractor, in all cases, be forfeited and returned.

Persons making proposals are desired to state their proposals for the year. Those who contract will receive their pay quarterly—in the months of February, May, August and November, one month after the expiration of each quarter.

No other than a free white person shall be employed to convey the mail.

Where the proposer intends to convey the mail in the body of a stage carriage, he is desired to state it in his proposals.

The Postmaster General reserves to himself the right of declaring any contract at an end whenver one failure happens, which amounts to the loss of a trip.

The contracts are to be in operation on the first day of January next, and continue until December 31, 1816.
