4. Persons making proposals are desired to state their prices by the year. Those who contract will receive their pay quarterly-in the months of February, May, of each quarter.

5. No other than a free white person shall be employ-

ed to convey the mail. 6. Where the proposer intends to convey the mail in the body of a stage carriage, he is desired to state it in his proposals.

7. The Postmaster General reserves to himself the right of declaring any contract at an end whenever one fulure happens, which amounts to the loss of a trip. 8. The contracts are to be in operation on the first day
