- FOR the exhibition of a Ram Lamb of the most approved form, size and fleece; which shall have been reared after the 15th of December preceding, to be shown at the meeting of the society at May Court. A silver medal worth \$ 2 50
- For the best specimen of home spun Linen containing 14 yards; worth at least 75 cents per yard, to be exhibited at August Court. A medal worth \$ 5.
- For the largest and best product of small grain, viz. Wheat, Barley, Oats, or Rye, made on a single acre of ground; with a written treatise on the mode of raising it. For the August meeting. A medal worth \$ 5.
- For the largest product of merchantable Indian Corn, from a single acre—with a written treatise. For the meeting at November Court. A medal worth \$ 5.

The funds of the society being low, it is confidently hoped that the zeal and patriotism of our fellow citizens will supply the place of larger premiums. We think it our duty however, to observe that from a desire to encourage a spirit of improvement some friends to the institution have already volunteered in the exhibition of articles of domestic manufacture, for which no premiums had been offered; which, with the consent of the owners have been sold at auction, under the regulations of the society, at very liberal prices, and the money returned to the owners. We respectfully invite a continuance of such exhibitions, as well as competitions for medals, &c. Also we earnestly solicit communications from honorary members, and such other persons whose knowledge of agriculture, manufactures or the arts; or whose zeal for the promotion of general improvement, may prompt them thereto. In the mean time we acknowledge with gratitude the favours we have received from some of our distant friends. Though our funds have hitherto been small and a general apathy too prevalent, yet we may with propriety say that since the establishment of this institution in 1810, a spirit of emulation has been awakened, and our agricultural and manufacturing friends have already shown that our section of the country is by no means destitute of the talents, industry or resources necessary to render a country prosperous and happy. BY an act of the last General Assembly of this state, Commissioners were appointed for the purpose of designing and causing to be erected, on the public land adjoining the city of Raleigh, a commodious dwelling house and all necessary out houses; for the accommodation of the Chief Magistrate of the state; and, to enable them to raise a fund adequate to the object, they are authorized to sell at auction, the lot and improvements at present occupied by the Governor; and also a considerable portion of the public lands adjoining the city.—By virtue of this act of Assembly, and according to its tenor, the undersigned commissioners will commence the sale of said lot and lands, on the fourteenth day of May next, on the premises.

The terms of sale (consistent with the provisions of the act) will be specified at the time of sale.

The lot occupied by the Governor is thought to be the best situation for stores of any in the city, and is susceptible of divisions, so as to form several advantageous sites for mercantile or other business; and the dwelling house and out houses are so arranged as not to interfere with sites for store houses, but are well calculated to accommodate the family of a man who wishes to carry on business. Whether this lot will be sold all together or by parcels, will be made known hereafter. The lands are divided into lots of various sizes, of from about half an acre to ten or twelve acres. Many of the lots are well watered by branches and springs—some of them comprehend excellent meadow ground.—A large proportion of the land is in wood, & of a beautiful soil.
