# FOREIGN.

From the Boston Centinel.

### MOST IMPORTANT NEWS!

It never before has fallen to our lot to an Intelligence so stupendous as that which arrivals in Portsmouth and Halifax from England, enable us to do this day. The Paris and London dates are down to the 17th and 19th April.

The French Senate have dethroned Bonaparter He has si ce abdicated his crown in favor of the Bourbons: and has accepted an asylum in the little Island of Elba. Hostilities and war preparations had ceased;—and the peace of Europe was cor-

What effects these great events will have on the offairs of our country, time only can develope,-The hand of Providence is in them; and we have a right to hope for good.

The allied armies entered Paris the 31st March, as we have constantly malathined. The Emperor Alexander instantly repaired to the palace of Taleleyrand; and Bonaparte's downfall was made cere-The Russian Emperor immediately called on the French Senate to act. All its members in Paris, with Talleyrand at their head, assembled on the 1st of April. They immediately decreed the dethronement of Bonaparte; nominated a Provisional Government, of which Talleyrand was made Chief;—promulgated a new Constitution;—cal ed. Louis the 18th to the throne of France; and clothed the Count D'Artois, his brother, with the Provisional Government, until Louis should arrive.— The pro tempore government then ceased, and Talleyrand was named President of the Senate. The Emperor of Austria entered Paris the 13th April. He concurred in all the measures taken. The peotle, where he has opened a House of Emertainment, ple appeared to be extremely hapy, and unanime in favor of the change; and the organization of the new government proceeded rapidly, harmoniously

His wife, the late Empress, with her son, had not joined him and it was said would not.

The extent of the counter revolution in favor of the Bourbons, may be partly estimated when it is known, that Lebrun, Talleyrand, Barce, Marbois, onastes of France, signed the Constitution inviting Louis 18 th to the throne.

Champagny, Savary Maret, and other ministers of Napoleon have sworn allegiance to Louis. The national guards universally wore the white cockade; and the conscripts had been ordered to

#### Declaration of the Emperor Alexander.

The armies of the Allied powers have occupied the French Capital: The allied sovereigns meet the wishes of the French nation.

They declare, that if the conditions of peace required stronger guarantees when the object in view was the restraining of Bonaparte's ambitton, they ought to be more favorable, as soon as by returning to a wise government, France berself shall offer the assurance of tranquility. The Alfied Sovereigns proclaim, therefore,

That they will treat no more with Napoleon Bonaparte, or with any of his family

That they respect the integrity of antient France such as it existed under her legitimate kings; they may even do more, because they always profess the principle that, for the happiness of Europe, France ought to be great and strong to They will recognise and guarantee the Constitution which the French nation shall give uself.—

They accordingly invite the senate to appoint a Provisional Government, capable of providing for the want of Administration, and of preparing such constitution as may be adapted to the French people

The intentions which I have expressed are com-mon with me, with all the allied powers.
