BRIGADE ORDERS.

The commanding officers of the several regiments composing the seventh brigade of the militia of North Carolina, will cause their respective regiments to be assembled at the places and on the days herein specified, for the purpose of being mustered and reviewed, that is—The Regiment of Warren at Warrenton on Friday the second day of September next; the two Regiments Wake at Raleigh on Thursday the fifteenth day of September; The Regiment of Franklin at Louisburg on Wednesday the twenty first day of September; the Regiment of Nash at Nash c. on Thursday the twenty ninth day of September. The Commandants are further required to cause both the commissioned and non-commissioned officers belonging to their respective Regiments to be assembled at the places specified for the regimental reviews, for the purpose of instruction and discipline on the following days, that is: those belonging to both Regiments of Wake, the three days immediately preceding their reviews, viz. the twelfth, thirteenth and fourteenth of September; those belonging to the Franklin Regiment, the seventeenth, nineteenth and twentieth of September; and those belonging to the Nash Regiment the twenty sixth, twenty seventh and twenty eighth of September.
