The regiment will be organized at miltsborough, the place of rendezvous, under the orders of the commanding officers, from wheree they will be immediately trarehed to Norfolk, where they will receive their arms &co. It is required that each soldier furnish himself with a blanker and Impack before his departure from home, andro prevent any inconvenience for want of provision, each Captain or Inspeace before his departure from home, and to prevent any inconvenience for want of provision, each Captain or commanding officer of a Company is directed to purchase, or cause to be purchased on the credit of the government, the necessary subsistence on their march to hills-borough, where they will be supplied by the U. States Contractor in this State, who has been required so to do. The Captains or other commanding officers of companies will give certificates to persons by whom the supplies are furnished. And in the event of failure, to proque supplies in this way—tach officer and sudder will furnish himself with a sufficiency for a subsistance to the place of rendezvous. Transportation must be produced, and if necessary, pressing must be resorted to a but in no case whatever, is any act of impressment to be sanctioned by military sufficiently, unless a special licence in writing as first had and obtained from the commandant of the regiment where such impressment may take place.
