Treasury Department, November 15, 1814. IN pursuance of powers which have been duly vested in the Secretary of the Treasury, under an act of Congress entitled "An act to authorize a loan for a sum not exceeding three millions of dollars," approved by the President of the United States this 15th day of November, proposals will be received by the Secretary of the Treasury from this time until the first day of January next, and each proposal will be decided on as soon as it is received, and immediate notice of the decision given, for a loan to the United States of the sum of THREE MILLIONS OF DOLLARS, or any part thereof, on the following terms and in the following manner: 1. For the amount loaned, stock will be issued, when the instalments are completed, bearing interest at six per cent. per annum, payable quarterly yearly. The stock will be reimbursable at the pleasure of the United States, at any time after twelve years from the 31st day of December next, and the sinking fund is charged with the payment of the interest and the reimbursement of the principal, according to contract. 2. The proposals must state the amount to be loaned; the rate at which the stock will be received; the instalments in which the party will make the payment; and the bank in which the payments are to be made. 3. The payments will be received either in money, or in approved bank notes, or in Treasury notes due on or before the 1st of January next, at their par value, with the interest thereon accrued at the time of payment. But on failure to pay any instalment at the time stipulated, the next preceding instalment shall be forfeited for the use of the United States. 4. Scrip-certificates will be issued by the Cashiers of the banks where the payments shall be made, to the persons making the payments; the Cashiers will also, endorse the payment of the successive instalments; the scrip-certificates will be assignable by endorsement and delivery; and will be funded at the loan office of the state in which the bank is situated, where the payments have been made.
