### Preparatory School at the University.

SINCE it has become customary for those who superintend Grammar Schools and Academies, to recommend them to public patronage, by an enumeration either of local advantages, or their own qualifications as teachers; it is thought proper, at the present period, to state to the publick some circumstances relative to this School.  
The Students, whether the number be small or great, are divided into four classes according to the plan in the College. To those teachers who have not adopted this plan, the advantages, resulting from it, are almost inconceivable. By employing the same time, in attention to a class of ten, twelve or fifteen boys, which, according to the common method, would be divided between three or four classes, the teacher is enabled to render his instructions much more effectual; and, in general, to excite among his pupils such a spirit of emulation as to preclude the necessity of that harsh and rigorous discipline, which was formerly thought so essential. The lower classes are daily exercised in reading, writing and spelling—Murray's excellent course in Reading, as also in Grammar, is used. Parrani's Latin course, Mair's Introduction, Caesar, Sallust, Virgil and the Greek Testament, are read as the classes advance. Prosody, which is too much neglected at other schools, here claims particular attention—That a knowledge of this is not unimportant, it may suffice to remark, that the difference between the pronunciation of one acquainted with its rules, and that of another who pronounces at random, is equally as great, as that perceived between a native and a foreigner's.  
In addition to these studies all the classes are required to recite, on every Sabbath, a portion of the Holy Scriptures, together with other religious exercises, best calculated to impress upon young minds a proper regard to the subject. To those parents who are not professed Deists or Atheists, it surely cannot be a matter of indifference, whether their sons enjoy the opportunity of such instruction; or whether they be not only destitute of it, but exposed to such company and such principles, as have a strong and direct tendency to corrupt their morals.  
It may be urged, with apparent plausibility, that the price of boarding is higher here than at some Academies in this State. If, however, a just comparison be made between all the attendant circumstances, it will be found that this objection is more specious than solid; and that, in the end, there will not only be no loss, but a saving in money to such parents as may send their sons here to acquire the first rudiments of their education. As a proof of this, it has not unfrequently happened, that boys, who come here under the expectation of entering the Freshman or Sophomore class in College, have been found, upon examination, unqualified for the highest class in the school.  
As to the healthiness of the situation, it need only be observed, that but one student has died here in six or seven years past—Cases of sickness are very rare; and many parents in the lower country, who have sent their sons here laboring under diseases previously contracted, have had the satisfaction to meet them after an absence of six or twelve months, in perfect health.

### UNIVERSITY.

MR. THOMAS MITCHELL, whose appointment as Steward of the University of North-Carolina, was announced by the Committee of appointment, has declined serving in that capacity; and the Committee has engaged Mr. William Barbee, as Steward for the present year, on the following terms.—The price of board will be seventy five dollars for the year, to be apportioned to the two sessions according to the length of each respectively. Thus for the first session board will be \$45, and for the second session \$30, to be paid for each half session in advance.—The students are at liberty to board in the village or elsewhere if they choose to do so, provided they lodge in College: but having once entered with the Steward for half a session, (and they are in no instance required to enter for a longer time,) they must continue at commons for that half session or forfeit the payments made for it. To such of the Students as shall enter with the Steward for half a session, and shall at the same time have a supply of money sufficient for the board of a whole session, it is recommended that they deposit the residue of the money with the Tutor who shall have the collection of the tuition monies, to be subject to their drafts, for the purpose of paying their board for the next half session.
