NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN,

THAT agreeable to the act of Congress, entitled "An Act to provide additional revenues for defraying the expenses of Government and maintaining the public credit, by laying duties on Spirits distilled within the United States and territories thereof, and by amending the act laying duties on licenses to distillers of spiritous liquors," passed December 21 1814, every person who shall after the 1st day of February, 1815, distill spirits within the United States, is required in addition to the duty on the license already taken, or hereafter to be taken by him, to pay 20 cents a gallon on all spirits distilled after that day, or subject to the Excise tax in the said act expressed, to pay 25 cents a gallon on all such spirits, in which no license is required to be taken; and that agreeable to the said act, a bond is required previous to the said day, to be given to the Collector, and other duties required to be performed under penalties as therein prescribed. That the distiller may be more correctly advised of the several acts of Congress, and of the duties on spirits, and of the amendments thereto, a copy of which, with the several forms of State returns required from a distiller, is furnished to him, by the Collector, and a copy of which is also furnished, on demand, to each distiller, and such other blanks as will enable the distiller to comply with the several provisions of law.

RALEIGH ACADEMY.

THE exercises of this institution commenced, as usual, on the first Monday in January, under the superintendance of the Rev. M'PHEETERS, assisted by well qualified teachers. The literary department of the Female Academy is placed under the care of the Rev. Josiah Crandall, jun.—and the painting, drawing and ornamental needle-work, will be taught by Miss A. F. of New-York, a lady in all respects well qualified, who will have charge of the manners and deportment of the young ladies. The preparatory school will be conducted according to Mr. Lancaster's improved mode of teaching elementary knowledge, lately introduced into this country—the Trustees having had Mr. John Evans, of this city, thoroughly qualified for instructing youth after this manner, and are now engaged in enlarging their school room, and in fitting it up for this purpose. As soon as the work is finished, which will be in a few weeks, this mode of teaching will commence. In the mean time the children will be taught in the ordinary way.
