NORTH-CAROLINA.

Treasury Office, 10th February, 1815.

BE it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of North-Carolina, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That two thousand stand of arms, with the necessary accoutrements, twelve pieces of Artillery, Tents and Camp Equipage for two Regiments, consisting of One Thousand Rank and File each, be purchased under the direction of his Excellency the Governor, for the use of the State; and that the said Artillery be mounted in such way as his Excellency shall direct.

In obedience to the act of the General Assembly, entitled "An act to provide for the purchase of arms, artillery, tents & camp equipage for the use of this State, and for other purposes," passed December, 1814, and from which the foregoing extract is made—Notice is hereby given, That proposals will be received at this Office, on the date hereof, until the tenth day of May next, for supplying the State of North-Carolina with the arms, &c. above mentioned, or with any part of them.

As the public safety and the comfortable accommodation of this portion of our Militia which may, from time to time, be called into the service of the State, have been thought to require this measure—the patriotism, as well as the interests of the Citizens of the State at large may be considered as involved in the present application; and it is therefore not only hoped, but confidently expected, that the supplies wanted will be abundantly and promptly offered by them.

A person can learn the art of weaving on this Loom in two or three days. The whole process of weaving is carried on by the motion of the Baton. The Loom is simple in its construction, and easily kept in order.
