The Company can with confidence recommend this Loom as one of the most useful improvements in the Domestic Arts, which has been made; fifteen or twenty yards can with ease be woven in a day, of a thread which is usually denominated "a twelve hundred," and of a thread denominated "a six hundred," from thirty to forty yards can be woven in the day. A person can learn the art of weaving on this Loom in two or three days. The whole process of weaving is carried on by the motion of the Barton. The Loom is simple in its construction, and easily kept in order.
