LATEST FROM EUROPE.

By the arrival this afternoon of the schooner Commodore Macdonough, captain Gill, in 49 days from Bordeaux, we have received French papers to the 4th of February and Irish to the 31st of January...

From the Belfast News Letter of Jan. 31.

The accounts from the Congress at Vienna are contradictory. Every day brings a new statement...

The Emperor of Russia has appointed a committee to frame a Constitution for Poland.

London, Jan. 20.—We were yesterday informed that J. Q. Adams, Esq. who was lately Minister from the United States to the court of St. Petersburg...

January 26.—Late on Monday evening despatches were received at the admiralty from Sir George Collier, communicating the important information of an American squadron being at sea...

The Chatham 74, capt. Lloyd, was suddenly manned yesterday morning at Portsmouth, being ordered to sea, in consequence of information having been received that two American frigates were got out...

Some apprehensions are entertained lest the American squadron now out may fall in with the fleet for India, which recently sailed from the Downs without convoy.

The Prince of Neuchatel, American privateer of 119 men, 22 guns, has been taken and sent into Penzance.

It is ascertained that the Duke of Wellington succeeds Lord Castlereagh at Vienna. His Lordship we believe, has left Vienna on his return to this country, and the Duke has left Paris for Vienna.

Remains of Louis XVI and his Queen.—Paris papers of the 23d have arrived. They are entirely filled with the details of the ceremony that took place the preceding day...

January 37.—Besides the Chatham, of 74 guns, ordered to sea from Portsmouth, the Bonbay, of the same force, is ordered from the Downs; and the Liverpool, with some other strong frigates, from Plymouth...

Lady Hamilton—Lady Hamilton died at Calias on the 16th inst. Her origin was very humble, and she had experienced all those vicissitudes in early life which too generally attend those females whose beauty has betrayed them into vice...

We received this morning Paris papers to the 24th inst. (Tuesday last.) On Monday the Duke of Wellington had his audience of leave of the French King...

In consequence of the negotiations relative to Poland, new propositions have been made to Prussia, to engage her to relinquish her pretensions to Saxony.

1. Prussia shall recover the parts of Poland, in following nearly the course of the Wartha, formerly it was the Pulezka; 2. The moiety of Lusatia or Lower, Lusatia, comprehending Witterberg, and the bailiwicks of Thuringia;

Vienna, Jan. 15.—When the fate of Saxony shall be fixed, the principal powers will take up the subject of the provinces on the left bank of the Rhine, and warm and lively discussions are expected again to take place.

The Emperor Alexander has declared that he would not quit Vienna until all the great objects should be settled in a definitive manner.

Paris, Jan. 26.—The foreign ambassadors and ministers, on the 24th of this month, paid their respects to the king and the royal family, among which were remarked the American ministers...

January 27.—Lord Castlereagh returns, he says the Morning Chronicle, not because he has accomplished the objects of his mission—not because the great questions at issue are settled...

Belfast, Jan. 27.—The articles from Vienna inform us of great changes in the principal ministers at the Congress. Metternich, Nesselrode, and Hardenberg, are said to have resigned or been displaced...

January 31.—The quantity of Cotten manufactured at Manchester during the last twelve months, is estimated upon a moderate calculation, at 380,000 bags, reckoning each bag to weigh, upon an average, 2 wt. 3 lbs.

Lord Castlereagh and M. de Talleyrand are said to have formally complained of the needless delays in the Congress, and have declared on the part of their respective courts, that they will never consent to the union of Saxony to Prussia.

London, Jan. 27.—Now that matters have been finally settled at Gner, Mr. Crawford does not hesitate to declare amongst his friends, that the American Commissioners in signing the peace, have not exceeded their instructions...

From Bermuda.—By the Amicus, the editors of the Gazette have received Bermuda papers to the 20th ult. and have extracted a few marine articles.

The Royal Gazette of the 15th, contains commodore Decatur's official account of the capture of the President, and a long string of editorial remarks, so contradicting the commodore's statement...

In the Royal Gazette of the 22d, we find by a note from Mr. Ward, the editor, that in consequence of his remarks relative to the capture of the President, he had, the preceding Wednesday evening, been caned in the street, by Mr. Randolph...

Admiral Cockburn's Proclamation, announcing the ratification of the treaty, and ordering the suspension of hostilities, also appears in these papers. N. Y. Gazette.

Letter from the Const. on board the frigate Constitution, to his brother in Washington, city, of 2d March, 1815.

Constitution at sea, February 8th, 1815. Off Cape Finisere, Spain.

I have but a few moments, my dear friend, to tell you of my best health, and as good spirits, as I can see. It is a pleasure to me, which we receive from you, to hear of your recovery...

New-York, April 6.

Capt. Williams, of the ship Minerva, which arrived here yesterday from Charleston, informs us, that on Monday, at Meridian, the Cape of Delaware, he spoke a frigate...

New-York, April 7.

The pilot Boat Eric returned yesterday afternoon, from off Barnegat, with the wreck of the private armed schooner Surprise.

The Constitution's Prize.—Capt. Esdale, the sloop James, informed us, that on Tuesday off the Cape of Delaware, he spoke a ship of war, mounting 22 guns on a brig deck...

Washington City, April 7.

City of a letter from Commodore Campbell to Secretary of the Navy, dated Savannah, 2d March, 1815.

SIR—My respects to you of the 18th inst. you acquainted with my having dispatched a vessel from Cumberland, for the purpose of recovering from Admiral Cockburn the cargo and disarmed gun-vessel, taken at St. Mary's.

U. S. gun-vessel, No. 168, Cumberland Sound, March 18, 1815.

SIR—Proceeding with the despatch which I did me the honor to entrust to my care, I left from Tybee bar at 1 P. M. on the 16th inst. N. E. steering south; at half past 3 described in the S. E. quarter, which we soon found to be a ship standing N. N. W.—about 40 minutes she fired a gun and hoisted her colors...
