### Two Hundred Dollars Reward

FOR apprehending and bringing to conviction, a young man who calls himself Elijah Dotson, but his proper name is thought to be William Cradock, says he was born in Surry county, North Carolina, professed to be a hatter at this place, at other places a silver smith, and came to this place about 12 days ago, under the pretence of commencing the hating business, but took his departure on the night of the 11th inst. at which time he stole from me a Grey Horse, about 15 hands high, six years old, rather light made, no brands recollected, dappled on the legs, stood before in a remarkable manner, the nails being drove around the toes on account of badness of his hoofs, a small spot or lump on his nose above his right nostril, remarkably large veins on the edge of his jaw blades. Stole at the same time, a new saddle, double skirted, lined with seal skin, stitched with silver thread, the cantle on the pannel nailed on each side with an uncommon number of tough nails, a large bridoon braced bridle considerably worn, and also at the same time robbed me of one gold and four silver watches, viz: one gold watch double cased, the outside case considerably damaged, day of the month from centre, swiss plan, fly spring, cap, gold chain and seal, which appears as if touched with mercury—one silver double cased English watch, silver cap, makers names Eamer & Sons, London, No. 31; one silver English huntsman's watch, fly spring in pendant, flat glass, second hand, capped and jeweled, the glass cracked in three pieces; one single case French watch, day of the month from centre, the upper hoop or bezel cracked round about one third, corneal gold key, hair chain; one French single cased enameled dial, with a number of Masonic emblems interspersed around the edge, the figures in a small compass in the middle of the dial and short hands to suit. Watch makers and others throughout the United States, are requested to stop any of the above watches, and communicate information to the subscriber.

The above Dotson or Cradock, is about 20 or 21 years of age, five feet eight or nine inches high, rather gross made, fair complexion, fair hair, hazel eyes, short whiskers inclining to a yellow, a little round shouldered, a near very perceptible on the right side of his chin or lower edge of his cheek; wore while here a black or bottle green cloth coat, a waist coat with pearl buttons, he has a frock coat drab colour, a small black hat with crape around, one pair handsome pantaloons, 1 pair nankeen do, ruffal shirts; his pantaloons are made in the cavalier fashion, with sugar loaf black glass buttons—but may change his dress as he has more with him. The above Reward will be given to any person who will apprehend and confine him in any jail so that he can be brought to conviction.

### Clubfoot & Harlow's Creek Canal.

A COMPANY has recently been formed, and incorporated by act of the Legislature of North Carolina, for completing a communication between the waters of Neuse and Newport rivers, in the Eastern section of this State. This company called the "Clubfoot and Harlow's Creek Canal Company" is desirous of contracting with some person or persons who will undertake and give ample security for speedily performing the following work. A Canal is required to be cut and opened from the head of Clubfoot's to the head of Harlow's Creek, of the following description, viz: the Canal shall contain from one end to the other a depth of water not less than four feet at ordinary tides, free from stumps or other obstructions; it shall be 14 feet wide at bottom and increase at least one foot in width for every foot of perpendicular rise from bottom to top; the earth dug from said Canal shall be removed at least ten feet from the edges thereof; the Canal shall have four lie-by bays (at convenient distances from the ends of the canal, and from each other), which shall be as deep as the canal, sixty feet long at bottom and twelve feet in width exclusive of the width of the canal, and increasing in length and width in the same proportion to their perpendicular rise as the width of the canal; the channels of the said creeks to be cleared out from the heads to the mouths respectively so as to contain the same depth and width of water free from obstructions, as are required for the canal; the inconvenient crooks in said creeks are to be straightened, a ditch or ditches cut from end to end of the canal, and kept open outside of the banks, adequate to receive the water flowing from the adjoining country and to convey it into the creeks without injury to the canal; and substantial gates or locks erected at each end of the canal, competent to prevent the too rapid flow of the water through it.

It is believed by the company, and on that principle they have settled with the representatives of the former proprietor, that at least one fourth of the required work has been done.—The length of the canal is about two and a half miles.—The country through which it passes very level, and of a favorable soil for digging. Perhaps few better opportunities of profit can be presented to the enterprising and industrious than this undertaking holds forth.—Letters addressed to the President and Directors of the company, care of William Gaston, Newbern, N.
