Two Hundred Dollars Reward

FOR apprehending and bringing to conviction, a young man who calls himself Elijah Dotson, but whose name is thought to be *William Cradock*, says he was born in Sevier county, North Carolina, professed to be a hatter at this place, at other places a silver smith, and came to this place about 12 days ago, under the pretence of commencing the hating business, but took his departure on the night of the 11th inst. at which time he stole from me a *Grey Horse*, about 15 hands high, six years old, rather light made, no brands recollected, clipped on the legs, about before in a remarkable manner, the nails being drove around the toes on account of badness of his hoofs, a small splint or lump on his nose above his right nostril, remarkably large veins on the edge of his jaw blades. Stole at the same time a new saddle, double girthed, inlaid with seal skin, studded with silver thread, the cantle on the pannel nailed on each side with an uncommon number of tough nails, a large bridle, broken and considerably worn, and also at the same time robbed me of one pair of four silver watches, viz: one gold watch double cased, the outside case considerably damaged, day of the month from centre, Swiss plan, fly spring cap, gold chain and seal, which appears as if touched with mercury; one silver double cased English watch, silver cap, makers names *Esmer & Sons*, London, No. 381; one silver English hufsmans' watch, fly spring in pendant, flat glass, second hand, capped and jeweled, the glass cracked in three places; one single case French watch, day of the month from centre, the upper hoop or bezel cracked round about one third, corneal gold key, hair chain; one French single cased enamel dial, with a number of Masque emblems interspersed around the edge, the figures in a small compass in the middle of the dial and short hands to suit. Watch makers and others throughout the United States, are requested to stop any of the above watches, and communicate information to the subscriber.

The above Dotson or Cradock, is about 20 or 21 years of age, five feet eight or nine inches high, rather gross made, fair complexion, fair hair, hazel eyes, short whiskers inclining to a yellow, a little round shunkered, a soar very perceptible on the right side of his chin or lower edge of his cheek; wore white here a black or bottle green cloth coat, a waistcoat with pearl buttons, he has a frock coat drab colour, a small black hat with erape around, one pair handsome pantafoons, 1 pair nankendo. ruffled shirts; his pantaloons are made in the chevloner fashion, with sugar loaf black glass buttons, but may change his dress as he has more with him. The above reward will be given to any person who will apprehend and confine him in any jail so that he can be brought to conviction.

To cultivate peace and harmony with all nations upon impartial and reciprocal terms; and more especially, at the present, to improve and make the most of the treaty of peace lately concluded between this country and Great Britain. A person can learn the art of weaving on this Loom in two or three days. The whole process of weaving is carried on by the motion of the Bottom. The Loom is simple in its construction, and easily kept in order.
