NORTH-CAROLINA,

IT may be recollected that the Synod of the State, at their session in Fayetteville last July, had, through the medium of all the papers published in the city of Raleigh, a recommendation to the people of that county, to form themselves into a Moral Association for the suppression of vice and immorality. It was also recommended, that the Synod of the State, at their session of September next, appointed a committee of members as part of an intended Committee, and desired each of them, at his own discretion, to cause two or three to act in concert with them in drawing up a constitution for such an Association.

Those additional members were accordingly chosen, and the above duty was appointed to that purpose. The committee met according to appointment, and drew up a Constitution to be held up to public view.

With this design they have appointed, as a day of public meeting, Tuesday the 28th of next month (November) at Centre Church in the above county, to lay said constitution before their fellow-citizens for their consideration, and, if thought expedient, to organize a society for the above purpose.

As in this we are only copying after many of our fellow-citizens, in several of our sister States, the committee earnestly request, not only the citizens of the above county, but of those which are adjacent to it, to take notice, that, if such a society be organized, the example will be followed by many of our fellow-citizens, in forming similar auxiliary societies.

Such a general meeting from the several neighboring counties will be the more necessary, as a more general plan should then be laid down, by which the views of the contemplated societies may be concentrated in some one point, to give influence and energy to the ultimate design.
