From Mississippi. MAHETTA, July 4.

A force of the enemy from Vicksburg are in the vicinity of Clinton to day, and our forces under Wirt Adams are fighting them. Another column is said to be moving simultaneously from Natchez.

From Johnston's Army. IN THE FIELD, NEAR RUFUS STATION, July 4.

In order to counteract a flank movement in force by the enemy on our left, our army commenced to withdraw from the neighborhood of Marietta night before last.

The movement was conducted successfully. Gen. Hardee's corps in some places passed more than forty or fifty yards from the enemy's lines.

The army did not begin to move until just before daylight yesterday, and was conducted so quietly, that the enemy was not aware of it until the evacuation was completed.

Not a gun was fired along the lines during the night except from Kennesaw mountain about sunrise.

An hour or two later they advanced, leaving Marietta to the left, and passed near Military Institute, when our cavalry commenced skirmishing with a brigade of the enemy and attacked said force with one hundred dismounted cavalry and were compelled to retire.

We captured 30 heavy rifles, a few prisoners and horses. The enemy has been feeling for our position today.

Considerable skirmishing going on especially along French's front.

From Mississippi. MOBILE, July 4.

A special dispatch to the Register and Advertiser, from Macon, Miss., says: Gov. Clark to-day issued a proclamation calling out every able bodied man in the State to repel invasion to rendezvous at Brandon and Mississippi.

Yankee News. ATLANTA, July 4.

The Appeal has received the Nashville Union of the 29th, and the Chattanooga Gazette, of the 1st. Secretary Chase has resigned and Lincoln has sent in to the Senate the nomination of David Todd, of Ohio, as his successor.

Gold in New York, on the 30th, was 250. A bill is before Congress providing for calling out the National forces with a stipulation that the draft is not to be for less than one, nor more than three years, repeating the commutation clause in enrollment, and taxing income to provide for bounties.

The news from Grant is unimportant. Burnside reviewed the negro troops near Petersburg.

The Louisiana State archives are reported found buried near Baton Rouge and a part taken to New Orleans.

News from Liverpool of the 16th says, that the steamer Alabama reached Cherbourg on the 11th, and landed the crews of two captured vessels, and would be permitted to make extensive repairs.

The Daily News believes that a plot exists to overthrow Palmerston's ministry. The broken down scheme would be abandoned.

The prospect of peace, on the Danish question, is as remote as ever. Some excitement was made by the latest news from Peru. English and French ministers are trying to effect a reconciliation.

Commodore Goswami publishes, in the Times, a letter in justification of his destruction of prizes, the British government having refused to admit them into their ports for adjudication.

From the Hendersonville Times. HOLDEN A COMMON LIAR—THE WAY VANCE PAPERS ARE MADE.

The Hendersonville Times is the property of Mr. William Dedman, and its Editors have heretofore been Dr. W. L. Love and Dr. L. P. Sensabaugh—the former a Surgeon in the Confederate Army, and the latter a Surgeon in the State Service. Formerly, until the possession of office began to operate on the opinions of these gentlemen, they were good Conservatives, but recently they have become red hot Democrats.

There are at least twelvearrant falsehoods in the above article, brief as it is. We say this, not for political effect, but with chagrin and mortification. We are ashamed to think, yeo know, that we have one in our midst, a native North Carolinian, blessed with talent and fine attainments, who is so lost to every sense of rectitude, as to utter, in a single article of a few lines, such a series of willful and deliberate perversions of fact.

W. W. Holden is the author of the above extract. His assertions are not less base and false, than the mind that conceived them. We are utterly confounded. He does not give the above as information he has received, as hearsay, but he launches these unfounded statements upon the public, as being true beyond question, and as if he neither feared or expected any retaliation. Has the man lost all regard for truth? Does he write in his dreams? Is he bewitched? Has despair laid hold upon and debilitated his faculties? Has reason fled, left the fence so often prostituted for political purposes, or is he in the language of Holy Writ, "possessed?"

The language of Mr. Holden is so absolutely false, as to be wholly incomprehensible to us. Dr. W. L. Love is not a Surgeon in the Confederate Service. Dr. L. P. Sensabaugh is not a Surgeon in the State Service. We do not hold any office, except one the good people of Transylvania gave us about the time Mr. Holden voted North Carolina out of the Union. We have no office in expectancy; we have asked for none, nor has any been promised us. Hence the assertion is false, that "the possession of office" has influenced us in any way. But in this one instance, we can in part look over Mr. Holden's deviation from the truth, when we reflect that he has been Editor and scavenger of the Democratic party for nearly twenty years, for the shadow of office. As he has been for half a lifetime, so he thinks all others.

At Office, June 28th, 1864. MR. Wm. DEDMAN, SIR—I find the above extract in the North Carolina Standard of June 22d, 1864. The language is that of W. W. Holden, the would-be Governor of North Carolina. I ask you if the words quoted are true. Yours, truly, WM. L. LOVE, Editor.

DR. W. L. LOVE—Sir—You ask me if the quoted words in the above extract, taken from the North Carolina Standard, of the 22d instant, "are true." I answer they are not.

- 1. The enrolling officer did not "notify me" some four or five weeks ago, "that my paper must change its conservative tone."
- 2. The enrolling officer did not "notify me," that unless there was a change in the tone of my paper, it would be suppressed.
- 3. The enrolling officer did not "notify me," that unless this change was made, that I would be "arrested."
- 4. The enrolling officer did not "notify me," that unless I made this change, I would be "sent to camp as a conscript."
- 5. You were not "on hand" to rent the establishment, "at the time referred to. It was six or eight weeks after enrolling day, when you first named a trade to me."
- 6. I was not "compelled to rent" or sell to you, in order to save myself from conscription. I had been permanently exempted some two months before we traded.
- 7. I was not "compelled to print the paper for you."
- 8. In my opinion, Dr. Sensabaugh knew nothing of the trade, while in progress.

There was no "force" used in this transaction, to my knowledge, but I entered into it of my own free will and accord. Yours respectfully, etc., WM. DEDMAN.

Here's more of the same sort, from the same source, from W. W. Holden, from the same identical article. Read: "These are facts. Gov. Vance, if he was not a party to the transaction, now knows all about it and is taking the benefit of this forcible suppression by a Confederate officer, of a Conservative journal."

"These are facts." In these three little words are couched twelve falsehoods. The twelve above and the twelve below, are the same. "Oh my prophetic soul, my uncle!" Gov. Vance "a party to the transaction!" Is there any assertion too hazardous to this man? Surely it would seem not. Add this to thirteen. The "forcible suppression by a Confederate officer of a conservative journal." This is one more, and an unmitigated lie. Mr. Dedman says he traded his own free will and accord. We say so too. Mr. Holden who was 250 miles away says there was. Some one has spoken falsely. Who is it? Whom will you believe? Who ought to know? Mr. Dedman and ourself who were present, or Mr. Holden who was absent.

But we were warned—warned recounting the many untruths Mr. Holden has compelled us in self defence to notice. And when we reflect that this article is in a few hours to be laid before a christian community and fall into the hands of the gentle, the good, and the virtuous, we feel predisposed to recoil from what is an imperative duty. This article is simply defensive and unavoidable on our part, and Mr. Holden will learn in process of time that "the men of the mountain country" whom he has thus attempted to bamboozle, "are too high minded and too independent" to be misled at the August election by his wholesale misrepresentations and slander.
