I know nothing about the disposition made of the resolutions adopted by the meeting in Smithfield on the Tyber Brab dyorn, dor. rance, and Mr. Holden, and to satisfy the public mind on the subject, you will confer a favor on me by copying both sets of resolutions as published in the North Carolina Standard, of the 13th and 20th of January, 1864.

Resolved, That the late act of Congress, conscript ing those who had put substitutes in the army, was a gross violation of plighted faith between the government and her citizens, and is well calculated to destroy the confidence of the people in the stability Congress and the administration. Resolved, That North Carolina, as a sovereign and independent State, has the right to consult the present good, and future happiness of her citizens; and when she is forced to choose between a military despotism and her State sovereignty, for the good of her people, she will choose the latter by a Convention of her citizens.
